SPANISH-STYLE CHICKEN

Ingredients: 1 broiler-fryer (about 3 pounds), ready-to-cook, weight 4, cup flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons peanut oil, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup water, 1 can (8 1/2 ounces) small young peas, 1 can (4 ounces) pimientos.

Method: Have chicken cut in 8 to 10 pieces; reserve neck and giblets for other use. Wash and dry. Mix flour, salt and pepper on waxed paper or in paper bag; roll or shake chicken in flour mixture.

Heat peanut oil and butter in 12-inch skillet until very hot; add chicken and brown well. Add water and cover tightly; cook rapidly until tender; watch so as not to scorch and turn as necessary; chicken should be very brown at end of cooking—20 to 30 minutes.

Remove chicken from skillet to serving platter and keep warm. Add peas and pimientos (quartered) to skillet, including liquid in both cans. Stir over low heat with wooden spoon to get up browned particles in skillet; add a little more water if necessary to thin sauce. Pour over chicken and serve at once. Makes 4 servings.
