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Commission to Take Bids on Planting Job

Hayesville Interchange To Get Shrubs, Trees, Vines

Bids for planting 1,400 shrubs, 30 trees and 31,200 vines and also seeding a roadside area to grass, on the Hayesville interchange of the Salem-Portland freeway, will be received by the Oregon highway commission April 26. This work will complete the roadside improvement of the interchange section and is designed to prevent slope erosion and reduce headlight glare as well as enhance the appearance of this northerly gateway to Salem, highway officials said.

Another project calls for construction of approximately 8,000 feet of metal guard rail along the North Santiam highway at Detroit dam. The guard rail is to be installed at numerous locations not previously protected and the installation is expected to be completed by September of this year.

The third project to be opened on April 26, affecting this area, calls for the painting of all structural steel and metal rail on the Santiam bridge on the Pacific highway, 15 miles south of Salem. The painting of the bridge is to be done under traffic and is scheduled for completion by August 31, 1956.

Midnight Fire Cuts 2 Homes; Factory Burns Down Thursday

A new dwelling and a small factory were destroyed by fires in the East Salem area during the last 24 hours.

Thursday, a fire which started from a burning trash pile gutted a small factory at 3740 Garden Rd. Loss of uncompleted fixtures was estimated at \$2000 by Harry Wesley, owner, who said it is partly covered by insurance.

The plant manufactured store fixtures. Another fire early Friday morning destroyed a new, but unfinished home at 3410 Sunnyview Ave. and an adjoining four room house which was occupied by the William G. Hesketh family while the new structure was under construction.

Hesketh, who was at the fire scene this morning, along with several neighbors, paid tribute to the Four Corners fire department. "They really got here in a hurry, but the fire went too fast," he said.

He said he didn't know how the fire started, but that the new home he had been building had apparently "dried out" during the winter. "It went just like it had gasoline poured on it," he said.

The Hesketh family stayed with neighbors after the 12:30 a.m. fire. They got out of the older house in which they were sleeping with only their night clothes. Hesketh said the fire started in the new building.

The loss was partially covered by insurance. Both calls were answered by the Four Corners fire department but the reports came too late to save the buildings. Fire Chief Waldo Miller said.

City, County Officials Talk South Salem Sewer Problems
City and county officials made plans Thursday for mutual cooperation in improving the sewerage disposal problem in the South Salem suburbs area.

Officials from both groups met Thursday to review a county engineering survey on the subject. The meeting was merely to bring up to date on what the county is planning, Mayor Robert White said.

Annexation Talk Early
The mayor said he felt that it is too early to talk of annexation and said the city is not going to pursue it. "We just wanted to be ready in case residents came to ask," he said.

Sanitary problems of the area have drawn city, county and state attention this year. Instances of dangerously overflowing septic tanks into residential water meter boxes, around water pipes and into ditches were found.

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Working Youth Accident Rate Remains High

One of every 40 Oregon teenagers taking industrial jobs are liable to work injuries, according to a state bureau of labor study governing minors' employment over the last two years. The year of 1955, with a 21 per cent increase in employed minors had the same accident rate as 1954.

Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilson states the study points up a definite need for giving young workers safety instructions pertaining to the jobs they hold. He stresses the importance of safety-consciousness to all industries, particularly during the coming months when thousands of youths will take vacation work.

"Teen-agers are susceptible to accidents more than any other age group," Nilson said. "In Oregon the accident rate for the 14-19 group is double that of the next age group including those both five years younger and five years older."

Employed girls brought down the minors' accident average considerably, with only one out of every 158 reporting an occupational injury in the two-year period. Boys average one out of every 25 who were employed in 1955.

Robert DeArmond, board attorney, reported that the Salem district is entitled to the corpus of a trust fund established in favor of Hayesville approximately 20 years ago by an undesignated donor. The case has been in the courts for a number of years and a recent decision can be appealed by two cousins living in Pennsylvania. The fund now totals about \$6500.

The clerk was authorized to call for bids on eight school buses, five replacements and three additional machines. The district has \$50,000 in the replacement fund which will about cover the cost of five buses. Bids on the addition at Morning-side grade school will be opened at 9 a.m. May 3.

Other action taken during the three and a half hour session included:

Rejected the request for installation of a rifle range in Parish junior high school because of the hazards involved.

Agreed to investigate the personal liability problem of the district after Director Ray Cates said the coverage was "woefully lacking."

Adopted a plan presented by the superintendent for extending the program of instrumental music in the schools.

Decided to take \$344 from the emergency fund to send a group of custodial workers to a workshop in Medford.
