

Grand Jury to Air Mystery Of Rich Woman's 'Fadeout'

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Where Mrs. Evelyn Throsby Scott? The question has kept the Police Department, the district attorney's office, the newspapers and an assortment of lawyers in a dither for more than six weeks since the disappearance 11 months ago of the wealthy, 63-year-old matron became generally known.

The case and the position of her husband L. Ewing Scott, 59, in it are coming to some sort of climax in a grand jury investigation beginning next Tuesday.

The authorities say he did not report her disappearance. Friends went to the district attorney's office last July and asked for a quiet investigation. It was kept quiet at their request, although D.A.'s investigators questioned Scott last August and again last February.

The case became public knowledge March 6 when Mrs. Scott's brother E. Raymond Throsby, 53, petitioned the Superior Court for appointment as trustee of her estate. There followed a hue and cry, with Police Chief William H. Parker inquiring acidly at one stage as to how come the district attorney had not previously informed the police.

Teamster Official Jailed for Balk in N.Y. Racketeering Quiz

NEW YORK (AP)—An official of a Teamsters Union local has been sentenced to six months in jail for refusing to answer questions before a special federal grand jury investigating industrial racketeers.

Federal Judge Gregory F. Noonan says the witness, Joseph Curcio yesterday, U.S. Atty. Paul the content of court charge at any time by returning before the grand jury and answering the questions and producing union records.

Noonan imposed the sentence on Curcio Thursday, U.S. Atty. Paul W. Williams hailed this first punitive action in the grand jury's inquiry into racketeering in the

Williams, who is directing the investigation, said: "This is a very important development in the government's racketeering investigation. This gives us the power to compel these men to testify."

Williams had complained previously in statements that reluctant and balking witnesses were hampering the inquiry.

Machines That Talk to Each Other Forecast by Bell Head

CINCINNATI (AP)—The president of the Bell telephone laboratories in New York predicted here today that some day there will be machines which talk to machines in the same manner that people now talk to each other by telephone.

Dr. Mervin J. Kelly made the prediction as he appeared at a University of Cincinnati panel discussion on "America's Future Scientists, Engineers and Manufacturers."

The discussion was part of UC's observance of the 50th anniversary of the founding of its system of co-operative technological education.

Dr. Kelly predicted that when automation reaches its full development during the next few decades it will be possible to interconnect widely separated automation systems over the nation's communications systems.

Then, by means of an electronically transmitted digital language, automation systems of commerce, business and industry can be integrated and controlled from one source.

Dr. Kelly asserted that Americans need not fear automation. He asserted it would be beneficial economically and socially and called it "a growing economic and social force whose significance can well be larger than that of mechanization."
