Food Service Group Elects Trio of Oldtimers Given 50-Year Pins for Masonry Work

Three Salem Masons—recalled memories of early day Masonry Friday night when they were presented with 50-year pins by members of Pacific Lodge No. 50.

The three, Samuel Adolph, Edward Rostein and Dr. Corydon L. Blodgett, each has a half-century of Masonic membership in Salem's Pacific Lodge.

Ernest J. Bolliger, Portland, grand master of Oregon Masons, presented the pins to the trio of oldtimers.

Dr. Blodgett, a retired dentist, transferred to the Pacific Lodge from the Platte, S.D., lodge in 1920. He entered Masonry at Platte on April 7, 50 years ago.

Rostein, a real estate dealer, became Grand Master of the Pacific Lodge in 1913—the year the new Masonic temple at State and High streets was dedicated. He joined in June, 1905.

Adolph became a lodge member in February, 1906. He says his greatest thrill came when the building's elevator cable broke and Adolph rode the car to the bottom in a sudden drop.

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THE CAMERA CORNER

Let's turn to home movie-making today... a popular pastime. Ever stop to ask yourself what is the common fault with your movies? If your case is typical, the problem is common to all is that familiar "jiggle" of your picture all over the screen. You never see our local mountains and hills dancing or jumping up and down in their natural setting, so why should you see them jump and wobble on your movie screen?

Of course the best way to avoid the film movement on the screen is to use a tripod. Many times you do not have time to set up a tripod, or you do not have a tripod because its weight or size is more than your gadget bag will permit.

Today we have three substitutions for a tripod. The "Cenei Chain," a small unit about the size of a pocket watch, instantly ready for use with no fuss or bother and does a very credible job for either still or movies. The "Flexichamp," a handy tripod substitute with a ball joint will permit you to pan and follow your subject, and it may be fastened to most any flat or tubular surface. The "Unipod" is a very dependable unit, lightweight, compact, and permits slow steady panning of a subject in action.

If it is necessary to hand-hold some of the material, you can steady your camera, you can steady it by changing your shutter speed to 24 or 32 frames per second. Also when taking movies from a moving car use the faster speed of 32 frames per second if you have an adjustable camera. This will give you reader pictures on your screen when projecting your films.

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Four Indicted In Polk County

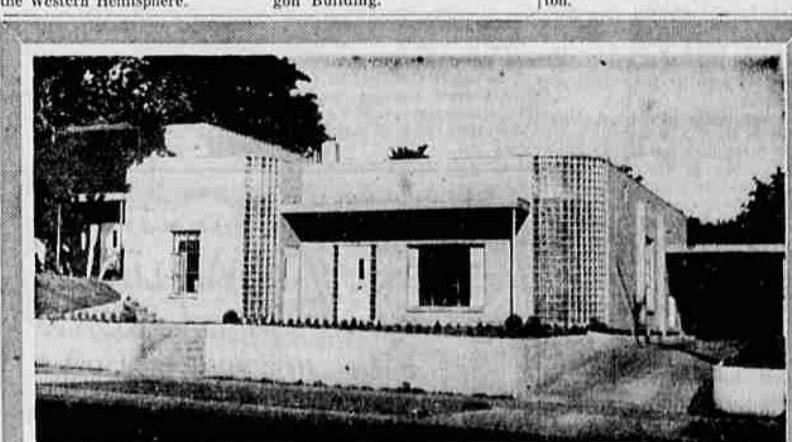
DALLAS—Four persons were indicted by the Polk county grand jury Friday.

Political Expert From India Sets Saturday Speech

Dr. Eddy Asirvatham, past president of the Indian Political Science Assn., will be the featured speaker at tonight's banquet at 7 p.m. of the Pacific Northwest Political Science Association at the Hotel Marston.
