

### Multi-Billion Housing Plan Up in Senate

#### Better Residences for Poor, Aged Feature Of Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate starts debate today on a multi-billion-dollar housing bill that would give the administration many things it asked for, and some it didn't.

No one has yet reduced the cost of the omnibus housing bill to any specific over-all dollar total. It leans heavily toward the provision of better housing for the poor and the aged.

One provision for a huge low-rental public housing program for low-income families—125,000 units a year for three years—was headed for a fight. Its sponsors have added a provision which would let the President boost the total to 200,000 units a year, or cut it to 50,000 units.

The administration has asked authorization for 35,000 units a year, or cut it to 50,000 units.

The administration has asked authorization for 35,000 units a year for two years. Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.), administration floor manager for the bill, has announced he will seek to have the total reduced to that level.

The measure also calls for an pioneering program to build 75,000 additional low-rent public housing units of special design to house elderly persons of small means. Construction would proceed at a rate of 15,000 units a year, beginning in midsummer.

The homes would provide dwelling space without stairs and with special-type fixtures designed for convenience and safety of elderly occupants. President Eisenhower had recommended a program of such housing to be designed for persons 65 or older.

The bill also would provide more liberal credit terms for the sale of homes for persons 60 or older by allow FHA insurance of up to 100 per cent of loans, 40-year mortgages, and purchase of the homes with only a \$200 down payment.

### Court Cases Speed Urged By Brownell

WASHINGTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Brownell called on lawyers and judges today to speed up their handling of court cases.

"The basic problem is to overcome inertia," he said.

Many factors contribute to the delay, he said, but among them he listed the "fundamental work habits and attitudes" of some lawyers and judges who he said "have become accustomed to a modus operandi (way of working) which takes delay into account."

Brownell's remarks were prepared for a two-day conference of 50 officials of bar associations and judicial organizations assembled to seek means of quickening the wheels of justice.

"We know that justice delayed often means justice denied," Brownell said.

Because of the delays, some persons settle legitimate claims at a fraction of their worth and others "have been driven to other means for resolving dispute," he said.

"We cannot afford to drive people from our courts to other means of settling disputes because judicial relief is so distant and remote as to be meaningless."

### British Fight Greek Youths

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—One British soldier was killed and three other soldiers, two policemen and three civilians were wounded in bomb attacks as troops fought pitched battles with youthful Greek Cypriot demonstrators in Nicosia Monday.

The demonstrations, most violent for many days, started when a crowd of schoolgirls paraded through Nicosia's main street carrying a huge Greek flag.

### BALLPLAYER ESCAPES HARM

CHICAGO (AP)—Orestes (Minnie) Mino, star outfielder for the Chicago White Sox, jumped onto the hood of an oncoming car to save himself from being run over Sunday night.

Mino was paying a taxi driver after his return home from Comiskey Park when he saw the car bearing down on him. He shouted to the car to stop and, when it kept coming, jumped onto its hood at the last moment. He was not injured.

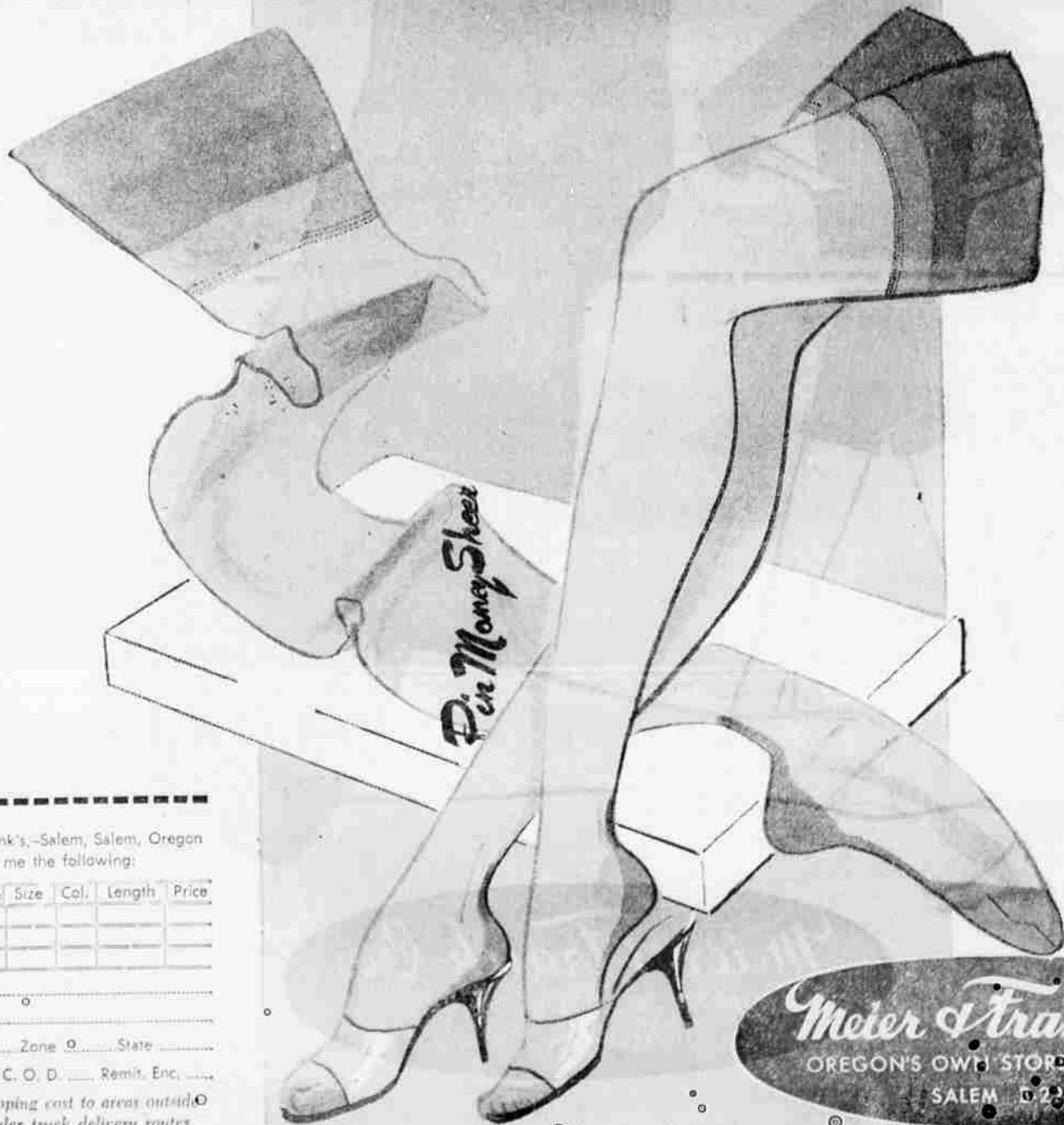
