

Four Records Set in NW Meet

Bearcats' Hartman Wins Two

Benson First in High; L & C Champion

Lewis and Clark took the Northwest conference track title as expected Saturday at McCulloch Stadium with 77.5 points to top underdog Whitman with a score of 62.5. Four new records were set with a fourth being tied.

Willamette trailed the two leaders with 54.5. Linfield had 46 5/6, Pacific 46 5/6 and College of Idaho 1 5/6. Two of the new marks were set in the field events with the shot-put and discus marks falling. Howard Glenn of Linfield threw the shot 46 feet 7 inches to surpass the old record held since 1954 by Jim Hitchman of Willamette by two inches.

Loren Michelson of the winning Pioneers broke his own former record of 141 feet 9 inches in the discus with a toss of 147 feet 7 inches.

Klicker Wins Low
Del Klicker continued his mastery over Dean Benson of Willamette in the low hurdles as the Whitman star skipped over the barriers in a record time of 23.8. Benson led up until the last two hurdles, but Klicker and Clarence Dukes passed him up when he lost his step. The Willamette star held the former record of 24.2 set last year.

Benson tied his record in the high hurdles with another 14.4 clocking although knocking over the seventh and tenth hurdles. He set the record last year and tied it in the Friday preliminaries.

Edgar Parrott of Whitman easily outdistanced the field in setting a new two-mile record. The smooth running whiz eclipsed the record of 10:01.3 set by Jim MacKenzie of Whitman in 1952 with a time of 9:58.8.

Dale Hartman of the Bearcats was the only double winner as the Bearcat distance star took wins in the mile and 800 with times of 4:27.7 and 2:00.4.

Hartman Winner
Hartman won by only five yards over Lewis and Clark's Bob Mitchell in the mile as he put on a tremendous last lap, but he had an easier time in the 800.

His closest opponent, Lynn Roumagne of the Pioneers, was disqualified for cutting in on Bob Miller of the Bearcats, but after threatening Hartman at the start of the final lap, he finished 12 yards behind in a wasted effort.

Three pole-vaulters attempted to surpass the conference mark of 12 feet 11 1/2 inches, but all three missed at 13 feet. Larry Thompson of Willamette, Rich Hintz of Linfield and Bob Richmond of Pacific were credited with vaults of 12 feet 4 1/2 inches before missing.

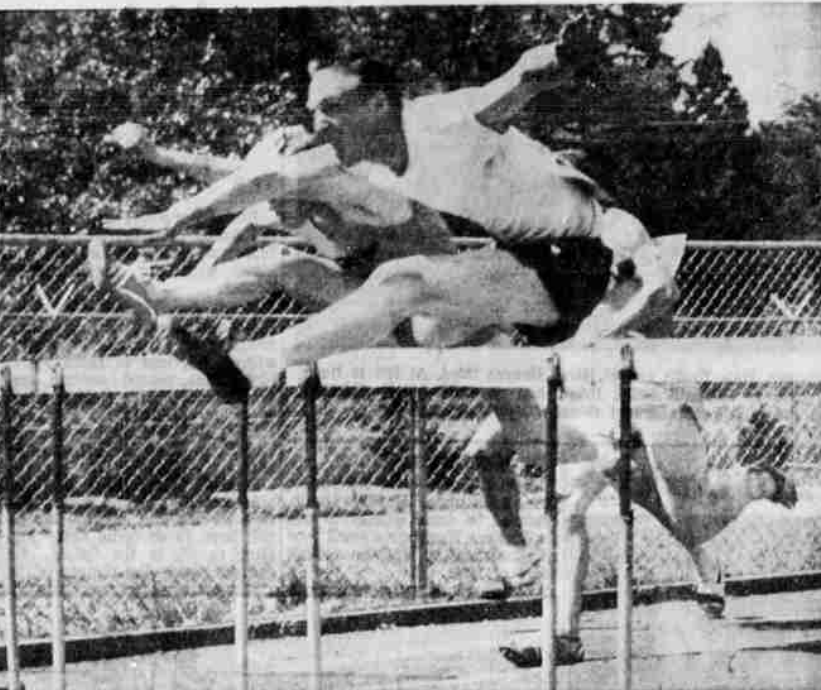

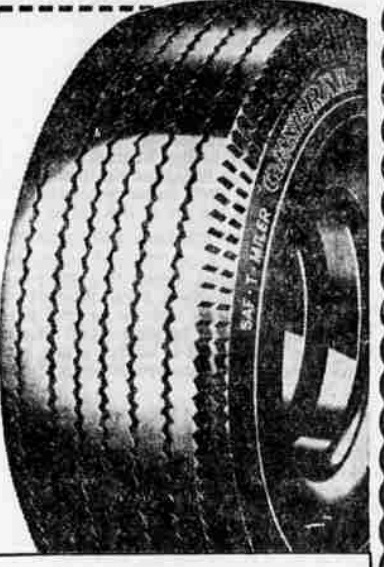

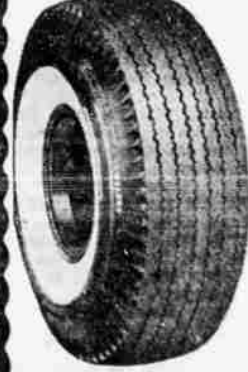
