Asphalt Will Cost County \$1 Ton Less

Marion county will save approximately \$1.00 a ton on asphaltic paving material by entering into a contract with a private firm.

This was disclosed Monday when bids were opened for 4,600 tons of asphalt for resurfacing roads in the suburban area and for an unannounced tonnage which will be used in repairing the Silverton road from the Salem city limits to Middle Grove.

Warren Northwest, Inc., submitted a low bid of \$5.59 per ton in each instance, Salem Black Top Paving Co. submitted a bid of \$6.59 per ton and Central Paving company was high with \$6.55.

Heretofore the county has been buying its road mix from a private operator and then hauling and laying it. The low bidder's price covers the complete job.

Youth Faces Car Stealing Charge Here

A 17-year-old Portland youth, arrested as "incurable" by the Marion county juvenile court has been remanded to the Marion county district court to face a charge of the theft of an automobile.

The juvenile court, in remanding Jerry Le Roy Tauscher to district court for further proceedings, said the action was taken after it appeared "that he is incurable and incapable of reformation."

The youth is charged with stealing the 1955 model automobile of Richard Berkeley, Hubbard, on May 4. He was arrested in Portland later and returned to Salem by sheriff's deputies.

Young Tauscher has been in considerable trouble with authorities for several years and has spent some time at the MacLaren School for Boys at Woodburn, authorities said.

Arraignment on the case in district court was continued to Friday.

Wanted Check Writer Caught

A man who has admitted passing several bad checks in Salem has been arrested in Portland on a charge of passing bad checks there, Salem police were informed Monday.

Theodore Clarence Moore has also admitted passing checks in Albany, Corvallis, McMinnville, Oregon City, Springfield and Eugene, according to Portland police.

A warrant charging Moore with obtaining money by false pretenses has been issued here, police said. His service will depend on the disposition of the Portland case and the wants of other cities involved.

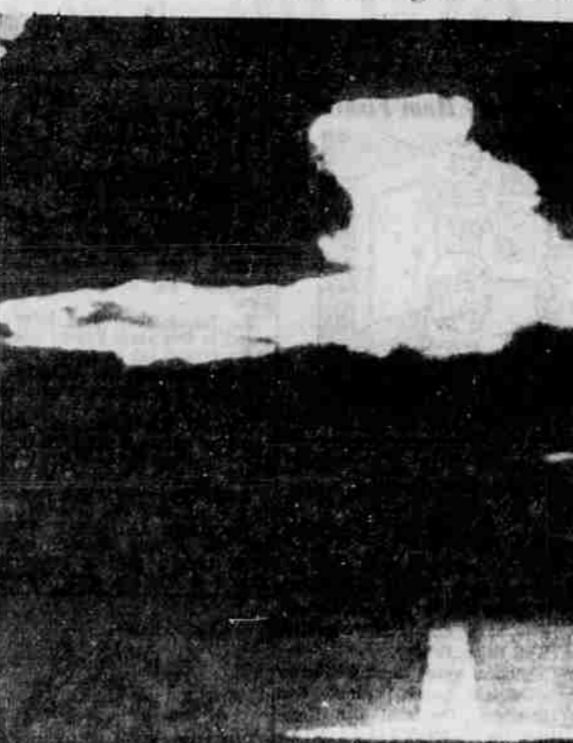

Youths Nabbed In Tire Roll 'Leave Home'

Two Salem teen-agers ran away from home Sunday night after being cited by city police to see the city juvenile officer.

Officers cited the two youths, ages 17 and 15, after they admitted taking about 20 used tires from a pile behind the General Tire store, C. Stage and State streets, and rolling them down the street. Officers said the tires were laying on lawns and curbs in the 100 block of South Cottage street.

The boys stopped when they started running at the sight of the police car and readily admitted the prank, saying they did it "just for fun." The incident occurred about 10 p.m.

Officers were called about two hours later to the home of the older boy where the father had found a note from the youth, saying he was running away because he had gotten into trouble again. A check of the other youth's home revealed he had run away also, officers said.

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Dikes Break, River Floods Idaho Farms

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho — The swollen Kootenai River, an annual spring enemy here, crashed through two dirt dikes and poured over 2,000 acres of farmland here Monday as the Army raced to the defense.

The defending dikes gave way while a unit of 500 infantrymen and engineers with heavy equipment rolled through the streets of Spokane, 10 miles away, en route from Ft. Lewis, Wash.

The Army defenders were dispatched to this North Idaho town at 2,000 after Gov. Robert E. Smylie declared a state of emergency when the river went over the listed 31-foot flood stage.

The Army will help build up protective dikes in 14 other "Alaina districts" which were still holding the water away from some 36,000 other acres of rich farmland.

The dikes around town can withstand water up to 37 feet. Dikes stand 35 to 27 feet in the farm areas.

Drunk, Knife Charges Send Trio to Jail

Three Woodburn Mexican farm laborers were sentenced to jail Monday, two on charges of driving while intoxicated and one for carrying a concealed weapon in two separate arrests early Sunday.

The first arrest, about 1:10 a.m. in Woodburn, was of Jose Ruiz Al dape, Rt. 2, Box 297, Woodburn, on a charge of driving while intoxicated and his companion, Anastacio Perez Sanchez, same address, for carrying a concealed weapon. Sanchez had a large, curved knife on his person, arresting sheriff's deputies said. He told officers he had been threatened by some other men and was carrying it for protection, they reported.

The second arrest about two hours later, was of Jose Bernal, Rt. 2, Box 18, Woodburn, who was charged with driving while intoxicated.

All three pleaded guilty before district court Judge E. O. Stader Jr. Aldape and Bernal were sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$100 each. Sanchez was sentenced to five days in jail on the concealed weapon charge.

Also Sentenced Monday on a charge of driving while intoxicated was Robert Edward Powers, Woodburn, who was arrested by state police. He was fined \$200 after pleading guilty to the charge.

Election Boards Wrong in Taking Wallace Name Off

Election boards which scratched the name of Lew Wallace off the Democratic gubernatorial ballot had no legal authority to do so, Dave O'Hara, head of the state elections division, said Monday.

Wallace announced his withdrawal several weeks ago, but he did it after the deadline for withdrawals. So his name stayed on the ballot.

Some Multnomah county precincts drew a line through Wallace's name.

O'Hara said a candidate's name can be marked off the ballot only if he dies.

Wallace came close to winning the Democratic nomination for governor.

Governor to Attend Water Rights Session

Gov. Elmo Smith will go to Boise Tuesday for a meeting of the Columbia Basin Inter-agency committee.

He said the committee, consisting of federal and state officials who deal with natural resource problems, will consider the threat to state water rights that might result from the U.S. Supreme Court's Pelton dam decision.

The court ruled legal the federal permit that authorized Portland General Electric Co. to build Pelton Dam after a state permit was denied. The dam is on the Deschutes river.

Bond Moneys Will Furnish Cleaner Park

A small child was narrowly missed by a dead limb which fell from a tree in Bush park last week, Park Superintendent Walter Wirth was informed Monday.

Wirth said that the passage of the \$35,000 special tax by city voters last Friday will provide funds for cleaning dead wood from park trees to prevent such occurrences in the future.

A letter to the park superintendent from Mrs. John O. Humphreys, 1285 South High St., told of the falling limb which narrowly missed four-year-old Carolyn Collins in the park on May 16.

The \$35,000 annual levy passed narrowly by Salem voters will provide for park maintenance. Wirth said that his department has been unable to provide the necessary maintenance, such as removing tree limbs, for some time because of lack of funds.

The park tax will also be used to increase recreational supervision and to replace obsolete equipment to get the parks back into shape, the park superintendent explained.

State Violent Death Toll 5 For Weekend

Violent death claimed five Oregonians over the weekend. Three of them were drowning victims.

John O'Brien, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence O'Brien of Deer, drowned in the Hood River Sunday after slipping into the swift stream while fishing near Deer, 19 miles upstream from the city of Hood River.

Lonnie Morley, 21-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Moody Jr. of Eagle Valley, also drowned Sunday. He found a hole in the fence around his home, 45 miles east of Baker, and tumbled off. His body was found later in an irrigation ditch nearby.

Elton R. Harris, 17, Portland, drowned Saturday while swimming in Blue Lake, east of Portland.

A highway collision killed Arik Galasheff, 50, Bonneville, on Highway 30, east of Bonneville Saturday. Bert Williams, Heppner, the driver of the other car, was injured seriously.

Southwest of Grants Pass Sunday night a head-on collision brought death to Samuel Otteheim Wertz, 78, a resident of the Jerome Prairie district there.

Mr. and Mrs. Hans Fred Dehless of Blue Lake, Calif., occupants of the other car, were hospitalized at Grants Pass.

Car Crash Kills Yogi Yorgesson

TONOPAH, Nev. — Yogi Yorgesson, radio and recording star, lost his life in a crash on a lonely desert road near here.

He was found dead Sunday in the wreckage of his expensive sedan. Police said he apparently fell asleep at the wheel. He was alone in the car.

Yogi, whose real name was Harry E. Stewart, had a big hit record some seasons back with his Swedish dialect version of "Jingle Bells."
