

FDR Jr. May Aid in Solving Disappearance

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Herald Tribune said today the Justice Department has asked lawyer Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. if he appealed to his client—the Dominican Republic government—to help solve the disappearance of Dr. Jesus de Galindez.

De Galindez, a citizen of the Dominican Republic and a lecturer at Columbia University, vanished March 12. He had been opposed to the Dominican regime of Generalissimo Rafael L. Trujillo.

In a dispatch from Washington, the Herald Tribune said: Roosevelt, former congressman and now registered counsel for the Dominican government, wrote to Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell, Jr. on May 1 to "exert and exhaust every effort" to solve the mystery. The late President's son also had sent similar appeals to Gov. Averell Harriman of New York and Frank S. Hogan, district attorney of Manhattan.

On May 18, Asst. Atty. Gen. Warren Olney III acknowledged Roosevelt's letter and said: "I am sure it would assist in the investigation of this matter to know whether you have addressed any such appeal to the government of the Dominican Republic, for which you are a registered agent, and, if so, the nature of the response."

The Dominican government has officially denied any knowledge of De Galindez's disappearance. Roosevelt could not be reached for comment.

Negro Pastor Lauds Ike for Race Attitude

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Until American brotherhood practices measure up to professions, the United States "can never win and hold the confidence of the peoples of the world," a Negro minister last night told the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The Rev. Archibald J. Carey Jr. of Chicago, addressing a vespers service before 3,000 delegates, PTA convention today, said: "The business of brotherhood, far from being sentimentalism, has become the very sinews of American defense."

The Rev. Mr. Carey, minister of Quin Chapel and vice chairman of President Eisenhower's Committee on Government Employment Policy, said the 24 months since the U.S. Supreme Court decision against race segregation in public schools has witnessed "the death struggle of an old order and the birth pains of a new order."

He said Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman "had set a fast pace."

"But President Eisenhower has gone the farthest of all. He himself has set a shining example of his belief that there shall be no second-class citizens in the United States," he declared.

Secret Service Has Real Job When Ike Goes Out to Dine

WASHINGTON (UP)—River stairs at the White House: What happens when the President of the United States goes out of the White House for dinner? Several days before the actual date, agents of the United States Secret Service arrive at the hotel where the dinner is to be held. They get a blueprint of the hotel and track every foot Mr. Eisenhower may follow on the day of the occasion.

If hotel personnel has changed substantially since the President last visited the place, names of the new help are furnished to the Secret Service several days in advance.

The Secret Service turns the new names into a large enrollment identification pool and within a matter of minutes, the men who protect the life of the President know the background of the men who will serve him his banquet food.

Someone started a story last weekend that the President goes to dinner only when a special White House chef precedes him. Not true.

If the Secret Service ever became so worried about the President was indicated, they probably would not let the President enter the hotel. Recurrent stories about White House food tasters, special chefs, eagle-eyed special waiters are interesting, but not vital.

When the President attends a banquet at, say, the Statler Hotel here or the Sheraton Park, the managers, wanting to have the best possible service, usually stick one of their best waiter captains behind him. This is not a security measure, but an effort by the hotel involved to give the President the best service possible.

The Secret Service has a rather detailed, working record of the hotel help in Washington. In advance of the late President Roosevelt's appearance at one local hotel, the agents of the Secret Service saw to it that nearly 50 persons on the hotel payroll were let off for the night, at least.

Why did the Secret Service sack these men and women? The bulk of them had records of minor crimes. But crimes involving violence, like cutting a husband's neck. The Secret Service does not like the idea of domestic knife slingers being in close proximity to the President.

Adlai, Estes Mix Tonight In Air Debate

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver discuss political issues face to face before a nationwide radio-television audience tonight in a state where they'll meet head on in their first Southern ballot clash.

Both candidates are enrolled in Florida's May 29 presidential preference primary for the support of 28 Democratic National Convention delegates. Their camps covet the prize not only for its bundle of votes but for its possible effect on the California presidential primary a week after Florida's.

Stevenson returned to Florida—a familiar campaign field now for both aspirants—encouraged by an 85 victory over Kefauver in Oregon's write-in contest for 16 convention delegates' support. He

undergoes a busy program of handshaking in the Miami area today. Kefauver had an Orlando Jaycee luncheon date after his Florida arrival today. Both contenders will campaign in the state through May 28.

The hourlong political joust between the Tennessee senator and the former Illinois governor is scheduled to be moderated by Quincy Howe of ABC.

The time of broadcast is 9 p.m. EST.

Sukarno Pays His Respects To Jefferson

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP)—President Sukarno of Indonesia, a devotee of Thomas Jefferson and his works, today paid tribute to the nation's third President as a man who inspired him to seek his own country's freedom.

"Jefferson was one of my teachers who inspired me to work for the freedom of Indonesia and to dedicate my life, not only for the happiness of my people but for all mankind," said Sukarno.

He said he regarded his visits to the Jeffersonian shrines in this home town of Jefferson as a pilgrimage. He placed red and white carnations on Jefferson's grave yesterday.

Sukarno and his official party of 15 spent the weekend in Charlottesville and left today by plane for Ft. Bragg, N.C.

The Indonesian President is making a transcontinental tour that eventually will take him to California. His 12-year-old Guntur has been looking forward to a visit to Disneyland, the fabulous children's park created by Walt Disney.

"Walt Disney knows how to appeal to the imagination of the children of every land, to all peoples everywhere," commented Sukarno.

Blood Cancer Victim Survives Over 2 Years in Unique Fight

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Leukemia, a blood cancer, found Joseph Ware an unwilling prey.

The chubby 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Ware of Ardmore, Okla., already has recorded "unheard of" accomplishments. He arrived at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation Hospital with acute leukemia when he was 4 months old and has survived the blood cancer attacks.

He has received no treatment since Sept. 1, 1953, but "we are still unwilling to say he is cured," Dr. Leonard P. Eitel, research director and cancer section chief, said.

Ten years ago, this would have been "unheard of," according to Eitel, because before the development of a battery of new drugs, the average victim of acute leukemia lived but three to four months.

Two companions have joined Joseph Ware for the treatment. One is Candy Craven, 3-year-old daughter of Sgt. and Mrs. Glenn Craven of Midwest City, Okla. Her case was diagnosed last November and she was released from the hospital after two months.

The third is little Richard McClure, hospitalized April 9. Ironically, 3-year-old Richie is the son of Lawrence McClure, a biochemist in the foundation's cancer section who concentrated on leukemia studies.

Japan to Ban Prostitution

TOKYO (AP)—Climaxing an eight-year fight, Japan's Parliament today outlawed all organized prostitution after next April 1.

The House of Councillors (Senate) unanimously approved legislation making illegal the operation after that date of any type of establishment for prostitution purposes. The House of Representatives approved the bill May 15.

The law does not prohibit the nation's estimated 140,000 prostitutes from operating independently. Its penalties, up to 10 years in prison, 1, 1958.

The law does strike, however, tentative organized red-light districts in Tokyo, Osaka, Atami and other areas. It also prohibits the age-old Japanese practice of parents selling their daughters into prostitution.

Exiled Cyprus Bishop Cancels Hunger Strike

LONDON (AP)—Archbishop Makarios, exiled leader of the Greek community of Cyprus, and three other clerics sent to the Seychelles Islands with him, went on a short hunger strike about two weeks ago, the British Colonial Office disclosed Monday.

They refused food for a day or so, a Ministry spokesman said. The Colonial Office did not disclose exactly what Makarios was protesting, but it was understood that he and his colleagues were concerned about censorship and delay of cablegrams and letters they had been writing.
