Need of Rest

Sends Baldock To Hospital

R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer is in Salem Memorial hospital for a complete physical check-up and a complete rest, according to W. C. Williams, deputy state highway engineer, Monday.

Because of the need of complete rest for at least a week, Baldock's attending physician decreed that no visitors be permitted.

As a result of Baldock's confinement in the hospital, the testimonial dinner planned by the highway department personnel at the Marion hotel next Friday night has been postponed. The date of the dinner will be announced later, Mr. Williams said.

Preparations for business and necessary to make several trips to Washington and other points during the last two months, had left Baldock exhausted. Sunday it was decided that a complete rest was necessary and at the same time he will undergo a complete physical check-up.

Funeral services for Fred J. Woelk, 94, for the past half century a resident of the Salem area, will be held from the Clough-Barrick funeral home at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday.

He was born in Germany November 23, 1861, and came to this country when a young boy. He lived in Michigan and Kansas before coming to Oregon in 1905. He operated a farm north-west of Salem for about 35 years.

Chicago Livestock

CHICAGO — Butcher hogs and cows jumped 25 to 30 cents Monday for the tenth straight day of advancing prices, one of the longest sustained upturns on record.

Numerous lots sold at \$18.00. This was the same as a few offerings made at that level. An 11 head lot reached \$18.25, but that was not enough hogs to qualify as a practical lot.

Most 190 to 200 pound butchers sold from \$17.50 to \$18.75. Sows sold from \$13.50 to \$15.75. In the cattle section steers sold steady to 50 cent lower while heifers held steady. A few loads of prime steers were taken at \$23.00 to \$23.50, the top. Most choice kinds went at \$19.75 to \$20.75 and good to low choice brought \$17.00 to \$19.50.

Mixed choice and prime heifers topped at \$21.25. Buyers paid \$24.00 in \$24.50 for choice and prime shorn lambs. Salable receipts were 8,000 hogs, 20,000 cattle, 300 calves and 1,000 sheep.

CHICAGO — Closing out of dealings in May futures created an erratic market on the board of Trade Monday.

Most grain futures sold a little lower much of the day, although losses never ran very high and there was some recovery before the close.

May wheat, and to a lesser extent May soybeans, suffered from quite heavy liquidation at times. May wheat closed 4 1/2-6 1/2 lower at 2.21 1/2-2.19 1/2; May corn 1 1/2-1 1/4 higher at 65-63 1/2; May soybeans 1 1/2-1 1/4 higher at 1.29 1/2-1.27 1/2.
