Ingredients: 1 1/2 cups quick-cooking rolled oats, 1/2 cup instant non-fat dry milk powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 cups water.

Method: Stir rolled oats, nonfat dry milk powder and salt together thoroughly. Bring water to boil in a saucepan; slowly stir the oatmeal mixture into the rapidly boiling water; use a whisk or fork for stirring. Cook and stir constantly over moderate heat until thickened—about 5 minutes. Serve with milk and brown sugar.
