Be Optimistic, Lieuallen Advises

North Salem high seniors totaling 332 were told Tuesday night before they received their diplomas that they should face the future with optimism.

The commencement address, based on the theme "A Faith To Live By" was given by Dr. Roy E. Lieuallen, president of Oregon College of Education.

Dr. Lieuallen spoke of the tremendous strides man has made during the past 50 years to improve his environment. It was upon this fact that he based his prediction for a bright future for the younger generation.

Christianity was characterized as one of our "strongest weapons" in Western Democracy's efforts to improve its environment.

Harry W. Scott, chairman of the school board presented the diplomas to the capped and gown-ed young folk as they marched across the stage of the school auditorium. They were presented by graduation by Gurnee Flesher, assistant principal.

Rev. A. G. Jamieson, Evangelical U. B. church pastor gave the invocation and benediction. A vocal quartet consisting of Joyce Mount, Nancy Weeks, Larry Goodman and Preston Goulder sang two selections with Judith Seely as accompanist.

Unander Plans Trip East to Peddle Bonds

State Treasurer Sig Unander will leave Salem Sunday for New York City to sign \$1,000,000 in State Bonds of Higher Education bonds.

The bonds were sold by the board on competitive bids to John Laeb and Co., and five other bond dealers. They will be repaid out of revenues received from students using the buildings.

The buildings are two dormitories and a cafeteria for men at Oregon State College.

Unander said the board plans selling an additional \$2,400,000 in building bonds Aug. 7 to provide funds to construct a dormitory at the University of Oregon, a student center at Portland State College and a college union building at Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland.

Unander will return to Salem late Monday.

Jet Crack-up Kills Woman, Child in Car

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A Minneapolis mother and her 5-year-old daughter died Tuesday night when an Air Force jet loaded with 104 rockets failed on takeoff, crashed into their car and caught fire.

A possible worse disaster was avoided when firemen covered the flaming car and plane with foam, preventing the rockets from exploding.

Dead in the crash were Mrs. Thelma R. Usher, 38, and her daughter, Rita, Mrs. Usher's husband, Clair, was hospitalized in shock and a son, Allen, 7, escaped injury. A housekeeper in the car with the family, Helga Anderson, 68, was hospitalized in critical condition.

The plane, a Scorpion fighter, was piloted by Capt. Donald H. Hamilton. The craft, traveling at about 120 miles per hour, crashed through two landing beacons, skidded through two fences and struck the car.

Hamilton, of Hillsboro, Texas, and his radar observer, 1st Lt. Henry Gerling of Overland Park, Kan., leaped to safety after the plane crashed into the Usher car. Neither was seriously hurt. Both are based here.

The complaint is based on a pedestrian-vehicle accident that occurred about two miles north of Salem on the Portland-Salem Freeway last January 12.

Grade Smash Kills Farmer

PENDLETON (AP)—A truck and a Union Pacific train collided at a grade crossing Tuesday afternoon, killing the truck driver. He was A. T. Haun, 60, Lowden, Wash., a dairy farmer.

Haun was returning home from a livestock sale at Westland when the truck and train collided at a grade crossing three miles southwest of Hermiston. Skid marks indicated that Haun applied his brakes at the last moment in an effort to avoid the collision.

The plaintiff asks \$35,000 for right leg injuries, as much more in punitive damages and the balance for medical, dental and hospital expenses as well as for loss of wages.

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Board Approves Purchase of General Mental Hospital Site

Awarding of Contract For Fairview Home Building Okayed

The state emergency board Tuesday not only approved purchase of the 492-acre Wilsonville tract selected by the state board of control as the site for the new \$14,000,000 general mental hospital but also authorized purchase of additional 13 acres to the tract.

But the purchase of the additional land, located in the northeast section of the larger tract of land, was first ruled defeated when only five members of the board voted in the affirmative.

Speaker of the House Ed Geary, chairman of the board, based his decision on a repealed statute providing the affirmative votes of six members of the board are necessary to allocate money from the emergency fund. The six-vote provision was repealed when a constitutional amendment was adopted authorizing the emergency board fund. The cost of the additional 13 acres was set at \$8,500.

State Senators Howard Elton of Canby and John C. F. Merrifield of Portland and Rep. Leon Davis of Hillsboro voted against the purchase while Chairman Geary, State Senator George Ulett of Coquille and Reps. Loran L. Stewart, Cottage Grove, Alfred H. Corbett, Portland, and Henry Semon of Klamath Falls favored the purchase.

Several members of the board protested that only five votes were necessary with the result that a few minutes later, in response to a call by the chairman, Sam Haley, legislative counsel appeared and ruled that only five votes were necessary to appropriate money from the fund. In this ruling, Rep. Corbett who is a Portland attorney, concurred and Chairman Geary announced reversal of his previous decision, holding that the purchase was approved.

Prayer as a solo, accompanied by Patricia Whelan, Rev. George H. Swift gave the invocation. Superintendent Walter Snyder gave out the diplomas as Aschenbrenner read the names.

This commencement was held in the gymnasium of the new school where seats were available for several hundred more than could attend in Leslie auditorium last year.

Upsurge Noted In Employment

The largest upsurge in employment this year in Oregon took place in May when nearly 10,000 persons went back to work, according to figures submitted by 26 local offices of the Oregon unemployment compensation commission.

The commission said that only 18,300 workers were looking for jobs on June 1 compared with 28,200 a month ago and 27,700 at the same time a year ago.

Payments to insured workers during May dropped to \$1,102,643, nearly a million dollars under the April total of \$2,083,231.

Opening up of agriculture activities, including berry picking in the Willamette valley and peas in the Milton-Freewater area, is expected to provide jobs for many of the unemployed, the commission stated.

remainder of the present biennium was approved by the board. The budget included a loan of \$5,000 from the Oregon Fescue Growers association which will now be repaid.
