

Property Tax Biggest Item Stewart Says

Brings in More Revenue Than Any Other Form of Taxation

Since the real property tax brings in more revenue than any other single form of taxation, it is expedient that it be kept alive and operated intelligently.

In this manner Samuel B. Stewart, of the State Tax Commission, and chairman of the valuation division, summed up a discussion dealing with the tough subject of taxation before the Salem Lions club Thursday noon at the Marion.

Because the assessor, the person considered the nearest to the property owner's pocketbook, is a target of political whims, Stewart indicated that this county official should be designated through some other means. In an Iowa county, the speaker said, the assessor was appointed by men influential in several different fields of endeavor.

In pointing up the need for a reappraisal program on the county level, Stewart spoke of a few instances where there were gross inequities. In Tillamook county, for instance where the revaluation program was inaugurated it was discovered that a house built in 1880 had never been on the assessment rolls.

In the community of John Day, Grant county, those engaged in revaluation procedures found one which had a 187.5 per cent valuation.

In the final analysis, said Stewart, it is the people themselves who determine the amount of taxation since they have the right to approve or veto the various budgets that appropriate the spending money.
