Judge William W. Wells of Pendleton, presiding. The court reversed a judgment of \$9,000 recovered by Tony Senger of Portland against the Vancouver Portland Bus company for injuries sustained in an automobile collision on June 12, 1952, and ordered the case returned to the trial court to sustain the defendant's motion for a directed verdict in favor of the bus company.

Accident in Portland — The accident occurred at the intersection of N.W. Tenth avenue and Couch street in Portland, and the supreme court held the evidence showed that Senger was illegally proceeding eastward on a westbound one-way street and failed to stop before entering an arterial street.

The high court found further that the bus driver was not guilty of any actionable negligence as the court put it "there was no duty on his part to maintain a lookout for a vehicle entering the intersection from the west on Couch street."

A petition of rehearing by Bella S. Nicol and others, defendants in a case brought by Mary Nicol Waterbury but further modified the decree of Circuit Judge James R. Bain by allowing the defendants certain amounts expended by them for taxes, insurance and mortgage payments which in the supreme court's previous opinion they had been directed to reconvey to the trustees of a trust.

Slight Gain in Sale of Bonds

Purchases of U.S. savings bonds in Marion county during May showed a small increase over May, 1955, to \$157,244 from \$153,413, according to Bruce Williams, county bond sales chairman. For the first five months of 1956, county purchases were \$1,132,968, a small increase over the \$1,177,772 of 1955.

Polk county's May purchases dropped from \$22,191 a year ago to \$19,278. For five months, Polk county dropped from \$145,428 to \$121,027. Linn county people purchased \$84,994 over bonds in May, 1956, compared with \$76,129 in 1955. For five months, Linn purchases were \$584,495 in 1956, \$539,582 in 1955. Yamhill county dropped from \$33,417 to \$37,754 in May, but dropped from \$412,259 to \$374,386 in the five months period.

Sales in the state at large dropped from \$3,281,427 in May, 1955, to \$2,821,207 in May, 1956. For the five months, purchases dropped from \$20,676,243 in 1955, to \$18,482,487 in 1956.

Miss Chaney was nominated by the Nationalist party and Miss Thompson by the Federalists in the Wednesday morning conventions. The general election is scheduled for Thursday afternoon.

The other Nationalist candidates are: Secretary of state, Linda Bowen, Baker; state treasurer, Joyce Lawrence, Astoria; attorney general, Tanis Tippley, Portland; and labor commissioner, Virginia Basler, Milwaukie.

The remainder of the Federalist ticket is: Secretary of state, Jan Tweedie, Eugene; state treasurer, Merilyn Hromas, Albany; attorney general, Deanne Dayton, Grants Pass; and labor commissioner, Myrna Brown, Pasadena.

Thompson said the boat turned over while they were fishing at about 1 p.m. He said he saw one of his companions briefly after the boat overturned, but that he did not see the other.

Thompson was pulled out of the water by police officer Jack Leonard of Eugene. He had been called by a railroad station employee who had seen the capsized boat on the lake.

Lumber Rolls Hits Record

Oregon's lumber industry had a record payroll of 375 million dollars last year, or 15 per cent more than in 1954, the state Unemployment Compensation Commission said Wednesday.

Payrolls of all business and industry were at an all-time record of \$1,390,065,127, or 8.7 per cent over 1954.

Thirty-one of the 36 counties reported higher payrolls last year. Payrolls of counties showing increases, and the percentage increase over 1954, follow:

Tree Removal Starts 12th St. Revamping

Removal of trees from Union street east of Summer by Warren Northwest was the start Wednesday of the 12th street project for which the people voted \$200,000 in 1954.

The state of Oregon is co-operating on the project to the extent of about \$50,000 for the reason that the project, linking 12th with Capitol and Summer by way of Union makes an important connection with state highway streets. The state highway department is doing the job by contract with Warren Northwest.

The project includes the building of a new street that, following the Southern Pacific tracks, curves from 12th into Union.

Clouds Back, Rains Coming
