BAKED NOODLES
Ingredients: 8 ounces (1½ cups) fine broken noodles; 1½ cups milk (scalded); 1 cup soft bread crumbs; ¼ cup coarsely grated sharp cheddar cheese (packed down); 2 tablespoons butter or margarine; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 tablespoon minced onion; 3 eggs (slightly beaten).

Method: Cook noodles in 2 quarts boiling water 5 minutes; drain. Mix milk, bread crumbs, grated cheese, butter, salt and minced onion; stir into slightly beaten eggs. Add noodles and mix well. Turn into 1½ quart baking dish. Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven 45 minutes or until a silver knife inserted in center comes out clean. Makes 6 servings.
