

U.S.-Deported Writer Works For Red Radio

LONDON (AP) — Cedric Belfrage, British-born writer deported from the United States because of Communist connections, is now broadcasting for Moscow radio.

Belfrage, who was shipped back to his native England last August, came on the air from Moscow Friday. The broadcast was the first indication he had gone to Russia.

In his broadcast he indicated that Russia has quit jamming U. S. and British broadcasts. He said the Voice of America is popular in Russia "as long as it plays music, which it does for two hours a day."

"Everyone wants to hear American popular music," he reported. "And I'd say they just can't get enough of it."

There was no indication whether Belfrage is still visiting or intends to remain in Russia.

Southern Spuds Hit All-Time Peak Prices in N. Y. Markets

NEW YORK (AP) — Southern potatoes reached "all-time peak levels" in New York retail markets of five pounds for 59 cents.

Michigan housewives have to pay more than \$1 for 10 pounds of spuds. A national food chain price expert says the potato situation is "almost to a point where a black market exists."

Chicago produce men said a week ago wholesale prices were the highest in 40 years. In New York, a wholesaler made it 30 cents.

Most potato dealers blame the high prices on continuing cold weather in growing areas, from Florida all along the East Coast to Long Island. Other sources blame the situation on government subsidies for livestock feed and starch. Floods in Europe also were listed as a contributing factor.

How long will the high prices last? Anywhere from two weeks to two months, say produce men, until the big Long Island, state of Washington and Idaho crops get rolling in high gear. Eventually plenty of potatoes will be available and the price will come down.

The "all-time peak levels" for retail potatoes here were reported by the New York City department of markets.

So, it's any consolation to housewives elsewhere, New York shoppers now are paying around 12 cents a pound for potatoes that cost 4 cents a pound a year ago at one national chain.

California potatoes—which benefitted from the lack of competition caused by the cold weather along the Eastern seaboard growing belt—are selling at around 14

Sectists Win Three Seats In Tokyo Diet

TOKYO (AP) — A militant sect threatening death to nonbelievers has succeeded in electing three of its missionaries to Parliament.

The three members of the Soka Gakkai organization polled about 800,000 votes in this week's election. Scores of their campaign workers were arrested on charges of election violations.

Soka Gakkai wants to become the state religion of Japan. The name literally means "Value Creating Academy." Its creed is derived from Buddhism, but its activities are more evangelistic. One slogan is "Let's convert everyone with words and arrows."

Orthodox Buddhists deny any relationship with Soka Gakkai. Many intensely hate the new group, which has a membership of 600,000.

The Value Creators, in 26 churches across Japan and at numerous meetings, conduct Buddhist services sprinkled with their own spiritualistic chants supposed to cast on the listeners a charm against illness and misfortune.

The sect is governed like Japan's old imperial army. It makes converts with a threat that "death and destruction await you in 90 days if you fail to join us." Many members are invalids and old people most vulnerable to such preaching.

During the election campaign, Soka Gakkai missionaries visited the homes of sick persons and preached, "Embrace our faith and vote for our candidates and your sick will be cured; otherwise, death and destruction will befall you."

Police say some poor people have died without proper medical care as a result of believing this.

Police Leave Church Unguarded to Allow Kidnaped Tot Return

Capture Fear, Not Ransom Amount, Delay Cause

WESTBURY, N. Y. (AP) — A Weinberger family spokesman said Friday the parents of the kidnaped baby now believe the kidnaper's fear of capture and not the amount of ransom is holding up the return of the baby.

David Holman, an uncle of Mrs. Beatrice Weinberger, mother of the missing five-week-old infant, made that comment when asked about reports that the Weinbergers had \$25,000 ready to ransom the child.

Holman, a former Nassau county assistant district attorney, also revealed police no longer are watching St. Brigid's Roman Catholic Church here. It has been kept open 24 hours a day in hopes the kidnaper would leave the baby there.

A dim light burns outside the church at night but Holman said the kidnaper could run into the church with the child without risking identification.

"I don't think it's a case of money now," said Holman. "I'm afraid apprehension and fear on the part of the kidnaper will keep him hiding. If any contact is made now, it will be made indirectly."

This is the ninth day since Peter was taken from his carriage on the rear patio of the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Morris Weinberger.

Each time the telephone rings in their home they hope against hope that this time it will be the real kidnaper, with news of their baby and how they can get him back.

With deadly frequency, however, it is some misguided crackpot or sadistic joker who pretends he knows where the child is and cruelly raises the Weinbergers' hopes.

Nassau County Chief of Detectives Stuyvesant Pinnell, who has been in charge of the case from the start, yesterday disclosed that the ransom note was signed "Your Baby Sitter."

The Weinbergers have never employed a baby sitter, although they have at times hired nurses.

County Sets Planning Meet

Members of the commission will discuss the advisability of placing of a zoning issue on the November general election ballot. Such a measure was defeated in the May primaries.
