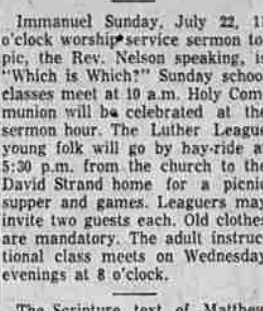
# Immanuel Lutheran Church Ready to Call New Pastor

# Portland Told To Supplement Water Supply

PORTLAND (UP)—The possibility that Bull Run reservoir could dry up by Sept. 19 if the state's present heat wave continued was expressed today by Chief Engineer Kenneth Anderson of the city water bureau.

Anderson urged the city to get started immediately on a \$20,000,000 four-year program of constructing water bureau facilities. The construction would be intended to head off possible water shortages in years to come and would do nothing toward increasing the city's present water supply.

The Bull Run reservoir stores 10-billion gallons of water. On Monday of this week it was full. Since Monday, Anderson said, the city has been consuming an all-time daily record of 161,000,000 gallons.

"And if we have three or four more days of this weather," Anderson said, "this will be raised to 200,000,000 gallons a day."

Last year maximum daily consumption was 156,000,000 gallons.

# Surf Traffic Cops Sought

HONOLULU (UP)—"Traffic Cops" to control surfboard traffic jams off crowded Waikiki Beach have been proposed by Herman Lemke, member of Honolulu's Board of Supervisors.

Lemke says so many surfboards are skimming the waves that he wants them banned altogether in some sections.

# Langley Says He Can't Talk Without Hands

SPOKANE (UP)—The man who will be keynote speaker at the Republican National Convention in San Francisco next month said Friday he can't seem to help "talking" with his hands.

"I guess I must think with my hands because I do not have the same easy flow of language when I deliberately control their movements," said Gov. Langley.

"Mrs. Langley, who is my most severe critic, told me I used my hands too much while delivering a keynote address at the Republican state convention."

The governor, an "off the cuff" talker, will have another speech problem at San Francisco. The national committee requires that the keynote speech be written and distributed to the press in advance of its delivery.
