Annual Allied Arts Fair, Saturday

A colorful affair interesting a large group next Saturday, July 28, will be the annual Allied Arts Fair of Salem Art association. The event will be staged on the grounds at the Bush House, Salem Art museum, High and Mission streets, between 12 o'clock noon and 5 p.m.

Many artists in varied fields from Salem and surrounding valley areas will participate in the affair and will set up their work between 10 a.m. and 12 o'clock noon.

The fair will open at noon then with invitation extended to all interested to attend. A nominal entry fee is being charged exhibitors, half of the money realized to buy work of Oregon artists for the permanent collection at Bush House, the other portion to go toward defraying expenses.

Effort is being made to give all the color that goes with such affairs, a la Greenwich Village or Paris sidewalk. Lines will be strung up to hang unframed pictures and other type of work. Exhibitors are being asked to take their own materials—step-ladders, tables, and other equipment. Some of the artists will do their painting or work on the grounds. Organ music will be presented through the Wiltsey-Weathers Music company.

Much of the artistic work displayed will be on

sale. There will be a concession stand for sandwiches and soft drinks.

Among groups entering work are Weavers guild; Creative Art group; some members of the Carl Hall classes; works of public school students, entered by Dr. Margaret McDevitt, head of art in the Salem public schools, this collection having been displayed recently at the National Education association in Portland; Salem Camera club with black and white division, salon prints and colored slides; Pentacle Theater group; Cascade Artists group from the coast area.

Ceramists, jewelry workers, leather craftsmen, painters in both water colors and oils, lapidary enthusiasts and others will be exhibiting.

Of special note will be the collection of pen and ink etchings by Heinz Laetsch, recently of Germany. This will be one of the special exhibits in the only display section.
