German Girl Now Happy In New Home

The bridegroom and two members of his wedding party each posted \$35 bail at the Salem police station Saturday night after they were arrested on charges of reckless driving.

The arresting officer said the car of Harley Gene Upton, Swishome, was seen headed northward on Liberty street at a high rate of speed, while being pursued by about a dozen other cars.

The officer took out in pursuit as the parade continued northward, turned west on Trade street and then southward on Commercial street. At 50 miles an hour but five of the cars had dropped out, he said. At 55, only two were still following Upton. The cars were slowed by heavy traffic in the 1000 block of South Commercial street and the officer caught up.

Upton, Harlan Jay Krause, Mapleton, and Raymond Mead, Portland, Florence, said they had left Upton's wedding and the others had been heading north while he attempted to escape them.

The unromantic officer escorted them to the station to post bail.

7 Burglaries

Huffman has been living with his father and step-mother near Silverton for the past several months, deputies said. Prior to that he had lived with his mother in Bend for a number of years but was sent to live with his father when he became a disciplinary problem.

Alinge was sent to live at the home on placement on MacLaren school after officials felt he had shown enough improvement in attitude to warrant such outside placement.

He was recalled to the school the day after the series of Woodburn and Gervais burglaries because Huffman's parents said they were unable to maintain any control over him, deputies reported. The return to the school had no connection with the burglaries, they said.

The safe found in the Albuque by a fisherman led to the arrest of Huffman. Huffman had been a suspect in the Brooks burglary, although there had been no evidence against him. The safe, found near his home, had black paint on it similar to that on Huffman's car and led to further investigation of Huffman.

With the permission of Huffman's father, who deputies listed as very cooperative, a search of the house was made and further evidence connecting the youth with the burglaries was uncovered. Under questioning, the youth soon admitted the break-ins and implicated Alinge, they said.

Vickers was bound over to the Marion county grand jury Monday morning after he waived preliminary hearing on the charge of burglary of the Park Medical pharmacy. Bail was set at \$2,000.

McKay was introduced by Ben Hazen of Portland. The two were schoolmates at Lincoln school in Portland 44 years ago. Citing McKay's accomplishments, Hazen said "he is now engaged in a battle for free enterprise against creeping socialism."

McKay made no allusions to his present political campaign, but spoke about the resources of the northwest relative to recreation and industry, including Canada.

About the future of the northwest he said that "we know exactly what is going to happen to us because it is already happening." He said the Columbia River "is our greatest asset," and lumber "our greatest industry," and spoke of the tree farm and reforestation programs.

Park Visits Noted
Illustrative of the American way of life, he mentioned that 50 million people visited national parks last year, which they were able to do, among other things, by the 40-hour week, paid vacations and good wages.

Alluding to free enterprise he said that "some people criticize big business. I was taught that anyone who starts a business, and it grows, is to be respected as long as he is honest. Some people frown on the man who succeeds."

"If we want to be as free as our ancestors were," he said, "two things are necessary, public education for one; the other to 'put into the hearts of our people a desire to continue our way of life.'"

He paid a tribute to the Canadian members of Kiwanis, and closed with an admonition for everyone to vote in the public elections.

Franklin Wrote Charter

Benjamin Franklin really wrote the charter of Kiwanis and the other modern American service clubs in eighteenth century Pennsylvania, Joseph O. Tally Jr., Fayetteville, N. C., an international trustee, told the convention.

Franklin organized a young men's club called a Junta soon after he located in Philadelphia with a threefold objective, fellowship, individual improvement and community betterment, Tally said, adding that this is the function of Kiwanis, though its community spreads around the world.

Kiwanis must be more than good in the sense of doing no evil, the personable young speaker told his attentive audience. We must be positive in good, an organization of leaders who do things, he predicted a much larger career of service as Kiwanis enters its third generation. Tally flew here from San Francisco Sunday and spoke enthusiastically of the beauties of the country.

Activities Reviewed
District Governor A. Freeman Sersanos briefly reviewed his activities and travels of the year and the accomplishments of the club.

The Monday morning session opened with community singing led by George N. Angell, who is widely known in the northwest as song leader. Kiwanian and newspaperman. He was able to stir the audience to its utmost in vocal effort. The colors were presented by Boy Scout troop No. 10, past district governors were introduced, and the invocation was by Dr. Titus Frazee, lieutenant-governor of District 12. Before the noon recess the convention committees were appointed by Governor Sersanos.

Registration at noon was about 500 men and 350 women.

Among caucuses called at the noon hour was one for the nomination of officers. President Sersanos said no names of nominees would be revealed before Tuesday morning and election will take place Tuesday forenoon. Two candidates for district lieutenant-governor were being deliberated on, and later in the day a candidate for the governorship will be taken up in caucus.

Kiwanis Open Conclave Here

Rev. Wayne Green Has Inspiration Address Sunday Night

Northwest Kiwanians and their ladies, here for the annual district convention, filled the sanctuary of the First Methodist church Sunday evening for their traditional convention opening inspirational program at which the Rev. Wayne Greene, pastor of the First Christian church here, was the speaker.

Rev. Greene spoke on the whimsical subject "Quit Wishing and Go Fishing!" using the term in the broad sense of activities. He reminded them that the fishing is good, the seas being full of them. He told his hearers that life consists more in the pursuit rather than in the realization of happiness or other worthy ends and that Kiwanians are great workers for better things in all their communities. Starting in 1915 Kiwanis has reached 250,000 members in 4228 clubs in the United States, Canada, Alaska and Hawaii.

Judge Arlie Walker gave a short memorial address honoring the 78 members in the Northwest district who have died in the past year. He reminded that though Kiwanis goes steadily on its membership and leadership changes constantly, new men coming in as others drop out.

Mayor Robert White welcomed the Kiwanians to Salem and District Governor Freeman Sersanos gave a response. The Salem Seniors sang several numbers including the Lord's prayer. The congregation opened with "America" and "God Save the Queen." Rev. George Swift gave the invocation and Rev. Louis E. White the benediction. They and Mayor White are all members of the Salem downtown club. Josef Schelker played the organ prelude and postlude.

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
