### No Salem Water Shortage Now Appears Imminent

Turner 100 million gallon reservoir is now filled to 85 per cent capacity and a water shortage for Salem during 1956 does not now appear imminent. This year high demand for home irrigation water came during the heat wave of mid-July and before local canneries required their heavy supply of municipal water.
