## Today's Menu

THE BRIDE COOKS SUPPER  
Good idea to serve a hot soup with a cold main course.  
Savory Shrimp Soup  
Cold Baked Lobster— Cole Slaw  
Hot Biscuits  
Cantaloupe Beverage  
SAVORY SHRIMP SOUP  
Ingredients: 1 can (10 ounces) condensed frozen cream of shrimp soup, 2 tablespoons tomato paste, 1/4 teaspoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon curry powder, minced chives or parsley (if desired).  
Method: Place unopened can of soup in hot water for 2 to 3 minutes before opening for easy removal. Turn soup into a saucepan; fill soup can with water and add. Heat slowly, stirring often, until melted; don't worry if soup looks curdly. Bring to a boil. Add tomato paste, sugar and curry powder. Stir well and allow to stand over low heat a few minutes. Serve sprinkled with chives or parsley if desired. Makes 2 servings.
