

Labor Council Favors Formal Endorsement Of Democratic Ticket

17-5 Decision Reached With Misgivings

FOREST PARK, Pa. (AP)—AFL-CIO leaders, having decided to back the Democratic ticket in the coming election, turned today to planning how they can help elect President Eisenhower.

The powerful AFL-CIO Executive Council wound up a long, closed-door argument by voting to recommend formal support for the Democratic ticket of Adlai Stevenson and Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee against Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon.

The decision was reached late yesterday with some misgivings.

Some council members felt their 15 million member labor organization would be sticking its neck out and cutting itself off from any chance for favors from the Republican party.

But the council, reportedly against the advice of AFL-CIO President George Meany, voted 17-5 to make an endorsement and then cast that endorsement by a 17-5 count to the Democrats.

The decision was made by a solid bloc of leaders of former CIO unions sparked by former CIO Chief Walter Reuther. He had been instrumental at the Democratic convention in getting Stevenson nominated. Reuther's clique persuaded a sprinkling of former AFL union locals to go along, while eight leaders of former AFL unions opposed any endorsement.

Meany and Secretary-Treasurer William Schnitzer abstained from voting. Four other members of the council were absent.

The AFL-CIO leaders today called a meeting of their political operating arm, the Committee on Political Education to discuss plans for marshaling votes for the Democratic Stevenson-Kefauver combination and for labor-endorsed candidates for Congress and key state offices.

No formal endorsements for the congressional and state races were to be announced, but the union leaders planned to go over the records of rival candidates and lay the basis for picking and choosing among contenders in major contests.

The 28-man AFL-CIO Council actually voted only to recommend a Stevenson-Kefauver endorsement to a meeting of heads of all 140 AFL-CIO unions in Chicago Sept. 12. But Meany conceded this will only be a formality and said he hadn't "the slightest doubt" the larger group will concur.

Tokyo Scolds Dulles

TOKYO (AP)—Some Japanese officials and newspapers Wednesday accused Secretary of State Dulles of threatening to take over Okinawa if Japan gives Russia the southern Kurile islands of Kunashiri and Etorofu. Others said he was trying to help the Japanese in their peace treaty negotiations with the Russians.

Dulles told his press conference in Washington Tuesday he had "reminded" the Japanese government and Foreign Minister Shigemitsu that nations which signed the San Francisco Peace Treaty could make new claims on Japan should Russia gain more than the San Francisco signers did.

Such additional claims are provided for in a clause of the San Francisco treaty. Dulles said he "merely reminded the Japanese of the existence of that clause. I did not attempt to indicate what its operation would be or that in fact it would be invoked."

Demos Confident of Northwest Triumph

IN Vancouver, Wash., where Stevenson and Kefauver met with political leaders yesterday, Stevenson was described by his press secretary as "delighted" at the news.

In Washington, Vice President Nixon declined comment. There also was no immediate comment from the White House on behalf of Eisenhower.

Meany, declining to say how he felt about it all, pledged to support the decision wholeheartedly. But he declined to predict any Democratic victory in November, saying "I'm no prophet."

Meany had counseled for many months that the newly merged AFL-CIO steer clear of tying itself to any political party, saying he couldn't see much basic difference between the two major parties anyway.

In announcing the Democratic endorsement however, Meany said the big labor organization was only exercising an American privilege to make a political choice.

Demos Confident of Northwest Triumph

Don't Handle Ike With Kid Gloves, Morse Advice

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—Democrats expressed optimism Tuesday over their prospects for victory in the Pacific Northwest next November.

Northwest leaders of the party were told in a closed meeting by James A. Finnegan that the Democrats can win "if we really work and organize." Finnegan is campaign director for Adlai Stevenson, Democratic presidential nominee.

Stevenson and Sen. Estes Kefauver, the vice presidential nominee, attended the meeting, one of a series of campaign conferences they are conducting over the region.

"You've heard a lot about Ike as a vote-getter," said Finnegan. "But since he has been President, the Republicans have lost more federal, state and municipal elections than during the presidency of any man since Herbert Hoover."

George Smathers (D-Fla.), chairman of the Senate Democratic Campaign Committee, called for reelection of Democratic Sens. Morse of Oregon and Magnuson of Washington. He warned that their defeat by Douglas McKay and Arthur Langley might give Republicans control of Congress.

Morse was applauded warmly when he said the Democrats can't handle Eisenhower "with kid gloves."

"The Democrats undoubtedly have to carry the fight on Eisenhower's record directly to the people," he said.

Magnuson urged that the party redouble its efforts with young people.

"Now that they have had almost four years of Republican administration," he said, "they will understand a Republican administration seriously jeopardizes their chances of equal opportunity."

Magnuson said "small businesses is a big issue, especially in the smaller towns."

Frank F. Church, sponsored winner of the Democratic nomination to the seat held by Republican Herman Welker, said GOP control of Idaho has left it "languishing behind all the rest of the West in economic growth."

He said that lack of "cheap and abundant electric power" has caused 40,000 people to leave Idaho over a period of years, and added Idaho's senators "have voted consistently against our natural interests."

Rep. Gracie Frost (D-Idaho) said that to put her state back in the Democratic column "we merely need to place the blame where it lies with respect to giveaways."

The farm situation, said John Reynolds, a Democratic nominee for Congress from Idaho, "is due not to inefficient farmers, but to inefficient government."

Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore) said there are ways that Democrats, with limited funds, can work for election of their candidates. She said that in her successful campaign in 1954, one young girl organized "15 separate coffee hours" and a young man organized 30 union meetings to support her.

Democrats Go Vote-Hunting In Farm Belt

Adlai and Keef Step Up Thrusts at Ike on Flying Tour

SIoux CITY, Iowa (AP)—Sharper, more direct thrusts at President Eisenhower marked the political swing of Adlai E. Stevenson and Sen. Estes Kefauver as they went vote-hunting in the Midwest farm belt today.

The Democratic presidential and vice presidential candidates were to fly in here early today for a closed conference with party leaders from Iowa, North and South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

In the coming election, the Democrats hope to capitalize on a sharp fall in farm income since 1951 and their program of high government price supports to turn the present Republican administration out of office.

The Agriculture Department reported last week, however, that the downward trend has been checked and that net farm income in 1956 will show an increase for the first time in four years.

Eisenhower vetoed a bill passed by the Democratic-controlled Congress last spring to junk the administration's flexible price support system and return to rigid, high-level prices.

Then he won passage of a bill more to his liking, including provision for a soil bank plan that would possess if it were the sovereign "to the entire exclusion of the exercise by the Republic of Panama of any such sovereign rights, power or authority."

Stevenson and Kefauver made a night flight from the Pacific Northwest where they accused the Eisenhower administration of compiling a record on natural resources that "could scarcely be worse."

But Stevenson also went after Eisenhower directly on another score.

He said that in the coming campaign he expected to discuss "the great issues of our time — war and peace and a better, safer, new America," and then he added:

"I only hope my opponent has time to face some of the realities of our declining influence abroad and our lost opportunities at home — and I don't mean on the putting green."

Kefauver, in accusing the Republicans of treating the nation's natural resources as "objects for plunder," also took a direct thrust at Eisenhower.

He blasted the administration's "partnership" principle for the development of electric power and said this was "President Eisenhower's personal policy."

"It may have been dreamed up in some New York banking house," as Dixon Yates was, but he made it his very own," Kefauver said.

The Democratic standard bearers held a closed conference in Vancouver, Wash., late yesterday with about 225 party leaders from Idaho and Utah.

It was the second of their regional strategy huddles in a fast-moving tour to key areas. The first conference was held in Santa Fe, N.M., Monday.

Russ Release Swedish Boat

STOCKHOLM (AP)—A Russian patrol boat seized a Swedish sailing ship nine miles off the Soviet Baltic coast Wednesday but released it less than five hours later.

The three-masted schooner, Flying Clipper, radioed high winds in the Baltic had blown her off course and to a point within the 12-mile limit Russia fixes as her territorial boundary.

The Flying Clipper had 36 men aboard.

Langley Asks Court to Toss 'Lynch' Counts

PORTLAND (AP)—Dist. Atty. William Langley said Tuesday that some of the grand jury proceedings that resulted in indictments against him were "lynch law" and he asked a court to throw out the indictments.

His move was on amendment of an earlier request that the indictments, charging conspiracy and malfeasance, be quashed.

Langley said the grand jury and Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton, who directed the jury's investigation of reports of vice and corruption, suppressed testimony witnesses knew to have valuable evidence. He charged further that "disreputable characters" were allowed to dominate the proceedings.

Langley is one of more than 30 persons indicted by the jury which was called after the Oregonian published articles alleging Seattle gamblers had tried to set up operation here.

Circuit Judge Frank Longenecker Tuesday appointed an attorney for Thomas E. Maloney, Spokane and Seattle race track clerk, who also was indicted. At Maloney's request Longenecker named Henry L. Hens as counsel. Maloney is charged with conspiracy to commit gambling and with four counts of bootlegging.

Demos Try to Dump Paschen

CHICAGO (AP)—There were increasing signs today that some Democratic party chieftains have concluded they must force Herbert C. Paschen off the state ticket or possibly endanger Adlai E. Stevenson's chances in the Illinois presidential election. Paschen is Democratic nominee for governor.

Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley, nominal head of the powerful Cook County Democratic organization, conceded that Paschen's name on the ballot could hurt "the entire ticket."

Paschen, the Cook County treasurer, has been under varying degrees of pressure to get off the party ticket since publication of stories dealing with a controversial fund in his office to which bankers contributed. He has defended the fund as proper, and said it was designed to help office employees.
