

'Old Pro' Sal Maglie Lifts Brooklyn into Tie for NL Lead

Redlegs Narrow Margin Yanks Win Again; Seven Games From Title

Sal Maglie, the old man with the beard who used to give Brooklyn fits, turns out to be the guy who pitched the Dodgers into a tie for the National League lead.

They called him "The Barber" around the league when Maglie worked for the New York Giants, partly because of the trademark stubble on his face and partly because his pitches close-shaved the batters.

In Brooklyn they called him something else. The 39-year-old righthander held a 23-11 lifetime

Art Fowler won his 11th in relief of Larry Jansen, who made his first appearance against his old mates.

Bobby Del Greco and Ken Boyer homered for the Cards, who now have won five in a row. Herm Wehmeier won it with relief.

Berra, needing one more to break Gabby Hartnett's home run record, smacked his 28th and Hank Bauer hit his 24th and 25th for the Yanks, who now need any combination of victories and Cleveland defeats totaling seven to clinch the flag. Hec Lopez, Harry Simpson and loser Art Dittmar homered for the A's.

BOSTON (AP)—Confident Larry Boardman — who gained national acclaim as a stand-in — looked forward Wednesday to a lightweight title match after adding Jimmy Carter to his list of victims.

"The right hand was everything," the 20-year-old Marlborough, Conn., youth said Tuesday night in the dressing room after flooring the embattled 32-year-old Carter three times in the eighth round for a technical knockout at 1:25.

Boardman weighed 137, Carter 139.

Boardman, rated the No. 1 contender for Joe Brown's lightweight crown by the National Boxing Assn., had hurt Carter with his short, overpowering right in the second round. Jimmy never quite got over it.

Each time after going down under rights in the eighth, Carter got up at three but referee Jimmy McCarron stepped in shortly after the third one. Carter had been knocked down only twice before in 104 fights.
