One-Way Grid Extension Due With Signals

Expansion to 13th St. Expected About October 15

Extension of Salem's one-way grid on four one-way streets north of the Capitol area one block east to 13th street will become effective as soon as traffic and railroad signals are installed. This was announced by Al Head, state highway traffic engineer, who said the new railroad installations are expected to be installed on October 15 or shortly thereafter. Railroad officials would not predict when the new gates will be installed because there has been a delay in shipping needed materials. The streets involved in the extension of the grid are Court, Chemeketa, Marion and Center streets. Capitol street from Court to Center streets will be made one-way for north-bound traffic. The entire length of 12th street was opened to traffic last Tuesday. Four-way stops have been placed into effect at the heavy traveled intersections. Work is under way in widening the 12th street bridge near the Southern Pacific depot, with its completion expected to take several months. Work on the Avigle Creek bridge, to the south, finished by the city of Salem, is expected to be finished by the first of the year, City Engineer Harold Davis said.

Child Dies Unexpectedly

Sharon Marie Iverson, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Iverson, died unexpectedly at the family home Thursday evening. Sharon's doctor said death was probably due to a heart ailment as she was born with a congenital heart condition. Several years ago she had undergone surgery for the condition. In an effort to save the girl's life city first aidmen rushed to the Iverson residence about 7 p.m. Ironically the little girl's uncle, Bert Iverson, was one of the aidmen. Born in Salem October 27, 1949, Sharon was a third grader at the Richmond school. Besides her parents she is survived by two brothers, Michael and Gerald Iverson, Salem. Announcement of funeral arrangements will be made later by the Howell-Edwards chapel.

Court Studies Street Project

Marion county court today took under advisement a proposed improvement of Gary street in the Keizer district between Pleasant View and Leo streets, a distance of two blocks. John Anderson, county engineer, estimated the probable cost of the improvement to be \$9042. The project is adjacent to 36 parcels of land over its course of 1428 feet in Hicks-Jones addition. Front foot cost is estimated to be \$3.15 along blocks 1, 2, 3 and 6. Bids for the project are contingent upon public approval and matters of drainage yet to be worked out.

Medina Says Only Few of Reds Exposed

LOS ANGELES (U. S. News)—Federal Judge Harold R. Medina, who presided at the 1949 trial of top U.S. Communists in New York, says the nation's drive on Communists has cleaned out "only the fellows on the fringe." "The really dangerous ones in the hard-core center have simply changed their strategy," Medina said. "It would be a very grave mistake for America to become less vigilant." Here for a state bar convention, Medina also told interviewers. "I'd rather see every Communist go scot free than abandon, dilute, or diminish a single one of our constitutional freedoms—and that includes the Fifth Amendment."

Demo Candidate Asks Voting Comparison

Holmes, Democratic nominee for governor in a press conference held at the Marion county Democratic headquarters Friday morning. Two Hubbard Boys Take Car, Damage Field

Two Hubbard schoolboys are in the custody of the juvenile court after a one-day campaign of car theft and property damage extending from Marion county to Vancouver, Wash. According to the story as told by one of the boys to Deputy Sheriff Amos Shaw they first played hookey from school Tuesday. They hitchhiked to Portland where, he said, they were looking for jobs. Not finding jobs immediately, they picked up a Pontiac car registered to Don J. Breck of Vancouver. They drove around for a time then piloted the car into a plowed field. They continued driving about in the field until they knocked over a fibert tree and got the car stalled in its roots. Borrowing a jack, they freed the car, drove some more, ran out of gasoline, borrowed some, bought a little more, got a job on a farm, abandoned the car in a graveyard, and then returned to their homes. They had damaged the car by going too fast around a corner. When the car was recovered it had about \$1500 worth of photographic equipment in the rear seat, belonging to the car owner. The field where they drove around in the soft ground and the damaged tree are owned by Wayne Bridge, Hubbard, Route 3, who estimated damage at \$250. The man who had loaned the boy the jack told the officers that one of them stuttered. Shaw recalled talking with a boy who had that speech impediment, and that led to the arrest.

2 Committees To Consolidate Industry Data

Elton H. Thompson, chairman of the industrial division of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, announced two committees Thursday that will consolidate much of the data that is requested by industries that are interested in the community. A. H. Dodd. The other committee will gather into brochure form studies and surveys that have been made of the Salem area by various agencies. On this committee are E. Simpson High On Timber Bid

Simpson Redwood company submitted the high bid of \$266,250 on 138 acres of timber located in the Detroit area of the Willamette National forest. The timber includes 550,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine; 400,000 board feet of cedar; 3,100,000 board feet hemlock and other species and 500,000 board feet of Noble fir. Other bids submitted were Cedar Creek Logging Co., \$262,125; Willamette Plywood Corp., \$238,750; Waller-Logging Co., \$236,550; and Vancouver Plywood Co., \$238,550. The advertised price was \$236,550.

Cox Sent to State Hospital

An order of commitment to Oregon state hospital was issued Thursday against Albert Cox, 64, of 1270 North Commercial, charged with molesting a 5-year-old girl. He was arrested Monday and had been free under \$3500 bail. Prior to the commitment order he had been scheduled for a preliminary hearing next Monday.

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VA Gives Rules On Reinstatement Of GI Insurance

Veterans administration representatives reminded this week that lapsed GI term insurance may still be reinstated before the end of the term period. The VA explained that if the five-year period has not expired the policies may be reinstated with payment of two monthly premiums. A medical examination is required if the policies have been lapsed more than three months. However, if the lapsed period is less than three months and the policy holders are in as good health as they were at the lapse date none is required.

Jury Awards Farm Worker \$11,847 For Truck Tumble

Ben Entrekim, farm laborer, on Thursday was awarded an \$11,847.50 judgment in Marion county circuit court for injuries sustained when he fell from the back of a truck operated by a Stayton farmer. Entrekim charged Hubert K. Bones and Marcine Barnett of Stayton with negligence in not providing safeguards to passengers at the back of a truck while transporting them to and from work.

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
