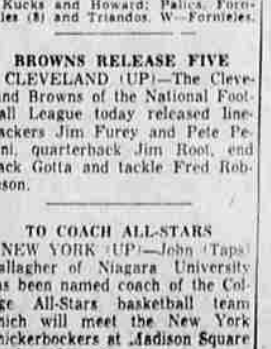

Mounties Sale Appears Near

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—President Leslie O'Connor of the Pacific Coast League said Monday the sale of the Vancouver Mounties by owner C. L. (Brick) Laws appears near.

Laws transferred his franchise to Vancouver from Oakland, Calif., after the 1955 season, for weeks has been reported offering the team for sale.

O'Connor told the PCL directors Monday: "Laws has made up his mind not to operate the team next season and now is in Vancouver dealing with two groups of local prospective buyers."

He didn't identify them. Vancouver finished the season in last place.

League directors ordered three prospective schedules drafted for 1957 while they decide whether to keep their split-week programming or return to week-long series.
