Strauss Says U.S. Leads in **All A-Plants**

Criticizes Stevenson's Charge Allies Trail Russ Progress

NEW YORK & — Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, says the United States is "the acknowledged world leader in every aspect of nuclear power development, both for national defense and for peaceful uses."

Strauss, speaking last night before the New York Board of Trade, exiticized a charge by Adlai Stevedson, Democratic presidential candidate, that the United States was lagging behind Britain and the Soviet Union in the development of full-scale atomic power plants.

Until just before President Elisenhower was inaugurated, Strauss, said, "the opportunities for private development of nu-clear power did not exist."
Within a week after the new atomic energy law was enacted in 1954, Strauss said, "President Elisenhower broke ground for a full-scale power plant at Shipping-port, Pa."

Of the 18 plants, Strauss said, "kix will be built by industry without depending on the government for any direct financial assist-

ance."
Reporting on over-all atomic progress, Strauss said the United States has built "a total of 82 reactors in this country, and at least 127 more are either already under construction or planned."


