

Duff and Clark in Touch-and-Go Pennsylvania Senatorial Battle

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—The current contest for one of Pennsylvania's two seats in the U.S. Senate shapes up as a touch-and-go battle royal between the blunt 73-year-old Republican incumbent, James H. Duff, and his soft-spoken, but intense, Democratic opponent, former Philadelphia Mayor Joseph S. Clark.

The Republicans expect Duff to sweep into a second term on the back swell of an Eisenhower victory wave. The Democrats predict Clark, 18 years Duff's junior, will carry to the Senate level the success he enjoyed in 1951—when he became the first Democratic mayor after 68 years of GOP rule in Philadelphia.

The Senate fight hinges in some measure on the outcome of the presidential balloting in the Keystone State with its 32 electoral votes.

The importance of Pennsylvania has been amply stressed by both major parties. President Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson each has visited the state twice in the present campaign.

Six years ago, Duff—a big man physically with his sandy, graying hair crew cut—defeated U.S. Sen. Francis J. Myers, the second Democrat elected by Pennsylvania to the upper house in 100 years. Myers died recently.

Duff was riding the crest of four years as governor. He had trounced, in the state's primary, the powerful faction identified for decades with former Sen. Joseph R. Grundy.

The situation is changed now. Duff is winding up his first term in the Senate without a firm grip on the GOP organization. Four months ago, the same forces he bested within his own party in 1950 turned him back in a tussle to reorganize the state committee for the November election campaign.

Six years ago, Duff could look at a voter registration list that gave Republicans a state margin of nearly \$50,000 over the Democrats in a total registration of five million. That margin has dwindled to less than half.

The some 40,000 state jobs under political control in Pennsylvania lay in GOP hands in 1950. Now that potent vote-getting lever is wielded by the Democrats through the election two years ago of George M. Lender as governor.

The brighter side of the GOP picture shows Duff clashing the unqualified support of President Eisenhower. The President, although studiously keeping out of state politics since establishing a farm home at Gettysburg, has called Duff "my senator." Duff was one of the early boosters of Eisenhower for the GOP presidential nomination.

How do the two Senate candidates compare?

Duff's crew-cut massiveness is marked by a fist-shaking, direct approach to people and issues. Clark is slim, curly-haired and on the quiet side—but an indefatigable campaigner.

Duff is a political veteran whose activities date back to the Bull Moose movement of Theodore Roosevelt in 1912. Clark was a comparative political amateur when he ran for mayor in 1951—his first bid for office—and won.

The two have one great point in common—a flare for jousting successfully with the "organization" when they feel the issue warrants opposition.

Duff parted company with the Grundy-controlled faction in 1949, when he refused to make special tax concessions to business interests at a time of general tax increases.

However, the segment of the state GOP organization Duff unseated in 1950 is back in control of the state committee. The organization is backing the Eisenhower-Nixon-Duff ticket, but "Big Jim" Duff no longer is setting the pace.

In Clark's case, as mayor he held old-time Philadelphia Democrats there was no place in city government for party "hacks" if they lack the proper qualification for City Hall jobs. His oft-repeated slogan—good government is the best politics—brought open enmity from some Democrats who felt that properly administered patronage was the road to political success. Clark, once a Republican, broke away from that party in 1928.

Dick Defends Hearing Over Reservation

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Friday defended plans for an Oct. 18 hearing at Klamath Falls on termination of federal control over Klamath Indians.

He said that Sen. Watkins (R-Utah) had stated that the hearing was "politically motivated."

Termination proceedings now hang over the head of the Klamath tribe, as a result of hasty legislation passed by the Republican 83rd Congress. Many persons fear that the vast stand of Ponderosa pine timber owned by the Indians may be put on the auction block with the result that the Klamath watershed may become a stump farm. Neuberger said.

He added that new legislation is "needed so that the termination can be slowed."

Watkins said that Neuberger's intent was "to get Doug McKay down there so he can help the reelection campaign of Sen. Wayne Morse."

Brody, associate professor of psychology at Oregon College of Education, was the principal speaker at a day-long meeting of the public health nursing section of the Oregon State Nurses Assn.

The meeting followed a convention of the full association in Eugene.

Brody said the rules for harmony between husbands and wives also hold true in other social situations.

The individual approaches his optimum when there is a minimum of domination by others, he said.

Ike Starts Celebration Of Birthday

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, starting his 66th birthday celebration a day in advance, received a 7 by 8 foot birthday card Saturday from a 9-year-old Connecticut boy.

The youngster, Joseph P. (Jay) Donahue Jr. of Naugatuck, Conn., called at the White House as Republicans prepared for "Ike Day" celebrations across the nation.

The festivities were held early because Eisenhower's birthday falls on Sunday this year.

Joseph, who won a contest sponsored by the Naugatuck Citizens for Eisenhower, presented his giant birthday greeting to the President in the White House rose garden.

Eisenhower took young Donahue into his office and rustled up several gifts for him from his desk. They included a pen, a knife and a silver dollar minted in 1890, the year of the President's birth.

GOP sponsors of various "Ike Day" activities have called on all Americans to wish Eisenhower a happy birthday and to pledge they will vote on election day.

The celebrations will be climaxed Saturday night by a half-hour network radio and television show (CBS), in which the President will participate briefly from the White House.

He is the 11th person to be taken into custody since a federal grand jury completed a probe into the way in which memberships were sold in several plywood cooperatives.

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3 Descend on One Chute

FT. BRAGG, N.C. (AP)—Two paratroopers could thank a master sergeant for saving them from possible death or serious injury when he grabbed them during a jump recently and the three descended on one parachute.

The incident, which occurred Wednesday during a mass jump at Ft. Benning, Ga., came to light yesterday.

The hero of the story is M. Sgt. Louis Berthiaume of New Orleans, a veteran of 15 years service, who held on to Pfc Frank L. Rumber of Pittsburgh and Sp3C William J. Meek of Chillicothe, Ohio, after their parachutes became entangled.

Berthiaume, whose chute was fully opened, said he saw Rumber's boots coming "at me from the right" 800 feet over the drop zone. Rumber's chute became entangled in Berthiaume's suspension line and as he slid by, Berthiaume grabbed him. Rumber said he "had been swinging wide from another trooper to avoid tangling with his chute."

Meek's parachute then fell atop Berthiaume's, becoming entangled in the upper part. Berthiaume grabbed him and the three rode down together. They did not pull their emergency chutes for fear of worsening the situation.

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Group Opposes Cigaret Tax

PORTLAND (AP)—The Portland City Club, a businessmen's luncheon and study group, Friday recommended defeat of the cigarette tax at the Nov. 6 election.

The club approved a constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to establish qualifications for the county offices of surveyor and coroner.

Unanimous approval was given to the measure to fluoridate the city's water supply.

The United Fund budget for the Salem area this year calls for a total of \$227,800.

Do you want the YMCA, YWCA, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts or Camp Fire Girls to curtail their character building programs or deny the benefits of their activities to some boy or girl just because you and others failed to do their fair share?

Do you want it on your conscience that Haven School or any one of Oregon's 16 state-wide agencies caring for orphans and foundlings or unwed mothers should have to curtail their activities because you and others failed to do your fair share?

REMEMBER—the United Fund represents one campaign in behalf of 29 agencies. This makes for efficiency and economy which would not be possible if each of these agencies were required to conduct individual campaigns.

What Is Your Fair Share?

The Salem Labor-Management Committee has set this figure as one hour's pay each month of the year. Many individuals in the Salem area have done more than their fair share as measured by this yard stick. Many more, however, have failed to measure up.

The United Fund Campaign goal was unanimously agreed upon by the Budget Committee, made up of 16 citizens representing all contributors: State Employees, Labor, Business, and Professional Groups. This quota was then approved by the Salem United Fund Board of Directors, composed of 42 community-minded men and women. The goal of \$227,800.00 is \$25,000.00 less than was requested by the Member Agencies and it is the considered opinion of this large group of Salem people that every dollar of this goal is needed and must be raised, otherwise all of the Agencies will be seriously crippled in their work.
