Salem Symphony association members, sponsors for the event, are not asking that concertgoers go all out for formal attire, but it would be nice to don the party frocks and make it a gala occasion.

Portland Symphony orchestra comes to Salem for a concert next Tuesday night to present a well balanced program chosen from the classical romantic and modern moods in music.

The program will be at 8:15 o'clock in the Willamette university Fine Arts auditorium; Theodore Bloomfield, conducting.

Opening the program will be Mr. Bloomfield's own transcription of Bach's Toccata and Fugue in G Major, a work originally composed for organ. The Bloomfield orchestration, which attempts to use the orchestra as Bach might have used it, was first performed by the San Francisco Symphony on February 21, 1950, Pierre Monteux conducting.

Completing the first half of the concert will be a universally beloved work of Beethoven, the celebrated Fifth Symphony in C Minor. No four notes in all the literature are so familiar as the exclamatory four-note which opens the Beethoven work, the same famous four-note which stood as the world's musical symbol of "Victory" during World War II.

Following intermission, the Portland group will offer a selection composed by a colleague. The Sinfonietta of Jacob Avshalomov, Mr. Avshalomov, who conducts the Portland Junior Symphony, won the Naumburg award for 1954 with this work, and it will soon be released on Columbia records.

To commemorate the twentieth anniversary of the death of Altorino Respighi, Mr. Bloomfield will conduct the Portland Symphony in a performance of the tone poem "The Pines of Rome" as a colorful finale to the evening's music.

Respighi's work is in four parts, each seeking to portray in rich orchestral colors the moods of the famous pines, romantically identified with the Roman landscape.

The concluding section, depicting the pines of October meeting for Welcome Wagon club will be next Tuesday at 1 p.m. in the conference room on the mezzanine at Meier & Frank's Salem store.
