## Oldest Relics Of Culture in Japan Found

SAPPORO, Japan (AP)—Hokkaido University Friday announced discovery of relics from the earliest culture yet uncovered in Japan. It did not fix a date for the artifacts—mainly obsidian and stone blades, scrapers and hand-axes—but said they were embedded in a thick water-deposited terrace more than 10,000 years old.

The terrace was located near the Sea of Okhotsk coast of Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost island. The obsidian implements are strikingly similar to some of the earliest cultural remains previously found in Arctic Siberia. Kodama the archeologist discovered them. "Many of them resembled early flaked tools from Alaska and northern Canada," Carbon deposits surrounding the finds will be examined at the University of Michigan to determine their age.

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## Bridge Across Columbia Near Astoria Seen

**Confab at Olympia to Discuss Financing Of Huge Span**

Feasibility of constructing a bridge across the Columbia river at Astoria will be studied by engineers at a conference in Olympia, Wash., Oct. 29, according to Gov. Elmo Smith.

Gov. Smith and State Highway Engineer W. C. Williams said that while the deficit cost of continued adequate ferry service could well upset the annual deficit costs of the proposed bridge, the sale of long-term bonds might pose some problems.

The governor said every possibility of co-operation on the proposed \$34 million venture would be investigated.

"The great problem is whether or not any type of bonds could be sold for a period of the necessary 54 years," Williams said. "This would seem to be the major stumbling block in an attempt to finance and construct the bridge."

Traffic surveys have indicated it would require 54 years to retire the bonds on the assumption that the bridge was opened to traffic by 1962.

Williams estimated that the cost of adequate ferry service in the future at Astoria would probably result in a deficit equal to that of the bridge. New ferries and new docking facilities will be needed shortly, he added.

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## Wilson Sees Small Cut in Armed Forces

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Wilson says the armed forces may be reduced a little in size next year but will need nearly two billion dollars more than this year.

Wilson indicated at a news conference yesterday the number of men in uniform next year may be from 100,000 to 168,000 below the present strength of 2,800,000 men.

But defense spending is expected to increase 4 to 6 per cent, in the range of from 14 to two billion dollars, over the present 30½ billion dollar rate, he added. The increase will be "certainly less than 10 per cent," he said.

Asked whether the present Air Force goal of 137 wings by next June 30 will be reduced, he replied "I don't think anybody knows at the moment."

Without mentioning the Democratic presidential nominee by name, Wilson criticized suggestions by Adlai E. Stevenson that this country take the lead in seeking to halt H-bomb tests if other atomic powers agree, and that the possibility of ending the draft may be approaching.

"I think that both these things are irresponsible approaches to some very practical and realistic question."

## THE CAMERA CORNER

Sooner or later the amateur movie maker learns the importance of planning his movies beforehand. Now, this doesn't mean that every movie you shoot must be a gigantic production with a detailed shooting script. Of course, a prepared script makes for smoother running, but it's not essential. You can still exercise your ability to plan ahead by taking advantage of the time spent getting your camera ready. Let's say you come home and find your family in the midst of preparations for a barbecue dinner in the patio. Plenty of action here . . . you rush for your camera. Now's the time to keep your mind busy. Check sunlight and shadows for proper exposure. Make a mental note of the scenes you're going to highlight, such as the steaks sizzling, the coffee bubbling, the dishwashing and serving the meal. Decide upon a nice balance of long, medium and close-up shots.

Once you establish these habits, you will always have a quick substitute for the written script . . . Filming without a plan is like firing a gun without aiming. You've got to center on the target if you want results. Establish the habit, too, of keeping plenty of film on hand . . . that's one phase of planning that cannot be neglected. Come in soon and stock up on color and black-and-white films for your camera. For a newer, better camera, remember we carry all top makes, foreign and domestic.

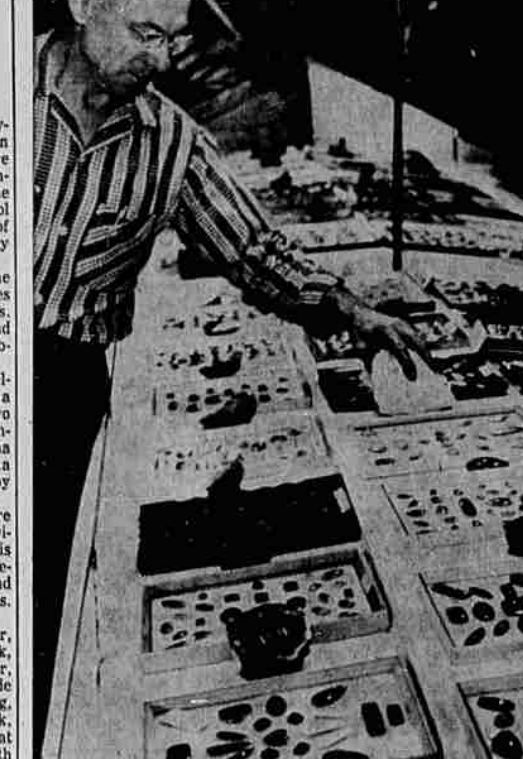

Three persons were hospitalized Saturday morning after a two-car collision at Winter and D streets, city police reported. None were reported in serious condition.

Officers said cars driven by William Hugh Shattuc, 882 Sunset Dr., and Ruth Elaine Collins, 40, 630 Cade St., collided about 7:10 a.m.

Hospitalized were Mrs. Collins, the lone occupant of her car, and Mrs. P. F. Shattuc and her 16-year-old daughter Jeanne, passengers in the Shattuc car. The latter two were thrown from the car as the car was swung in a half-circle by the impact of the collision, police said. Shattuc was not reported injured.

The injured were taken by Willamette ambulance to Salem general hospital, where Mrs. Shattuc's condition was reported as fair and condition of the other two as good. Mrs. Shattuc suffered lacerations of the head and right arm and a possible fracture of the right arm, hospital authorities said. Mrs. Collins, an expectant mother, suffered shock and bruises. She was being held for observation. Jeanne Shattuc suffered minor lacerations, it was reported.

Both cars were heavily damaged in the collision, police said. The intersection where the accident occurred is the only uncontrolled four-way intersection on D street, officers noted, and visibility for and of westbound cars is poor due to high yard levels and considerable shrubbery on both east corners of the intersection.
