100 Yards for TD
Scott scored three touchdowns with his first coming on the opening kickoff when he picked up the ball on the goal line and raced 100 yards to score. His other two TD's came on a pass from Burres and a short run.

The win gave the Saxons a 3-3 record for the season and kept them in the running for the district crown. Next Saturday they face the Corvallis Spartans, undefeated in district play, on Bennett Field.

South Salem's defense tightened in the second half and allowed the Warriors only 24 yards after the Saxons had a tough time holding Lebanon's trio of hard running backs in the opening half.

Scott let the opening kickoff get by him and went back to the goal line where he turned and raced up the left sideline to go all the way. He had perfect blocking with only one Warrior even getting near the speedster. Loren Blaco booted the extra point.

14-0 at Halftime
Burres engineered and accounted for most of the yards in the Saxons' second touchdown drive which started with four minutes remaining in the opening period from the Saxons' 41. He ran for 24 yards and passed for 12 more on the drive with it ending on a jump pass to Steve Berglund from the seven.

Blaco again added the extra point to make the score 14-0.

The score remained just that for the remainder of the half with the only concentrated drive being stopped on the Warrior 14 when a pass from Jerome Goertzen bounced off Berglund and fell into the arms of Roger Leatherman.

After holding the Warriors on their 36 the Saxons executed a 70 yard drive that needed just six plays to complete. Burres opened the drive with a pass to Foxley that went for 50 yards. A penalty and a five yard loss moved the ball back to the 30, but Burres completed one to Gary Ballew on the 10, tossed one to Berglund who carried to the four, and Scott then scored on an off tackle slant. Blaco made the extra point to make it 21-0.

Burres to Scott
The Saxons received another break in the third period when a Lebanon penalty gave them the ball on the Warrior 30. Three carries moved the ball to the 19 and Burres then threw a strike to Scott in the end zone. Blaco's kick was blocked.

Burres also personally accounted for the Saxons' first score in the final quarter. After an offside penalty had moved the ball back to the Saxons 42, Burres ripped off a 52 yard run that took the ball to the six. A penalty cost them five more yards, but Gary Dallman picked up three and Burres hit Berglund with a pass for the touchdown. Blaco's kick was deflected to leave the score 33-0.

The second team scored the final touchdown for the Saxons. A fumble gave the ball to South on the Lebanon 35 and it took seven plays to score with Foxley going the final two for the touchdown. Blaco's kick was again blocked.

South dominated the statistics, gaining 347 yards to 110 for the losers. They also outscored the Warriors, 15-7.

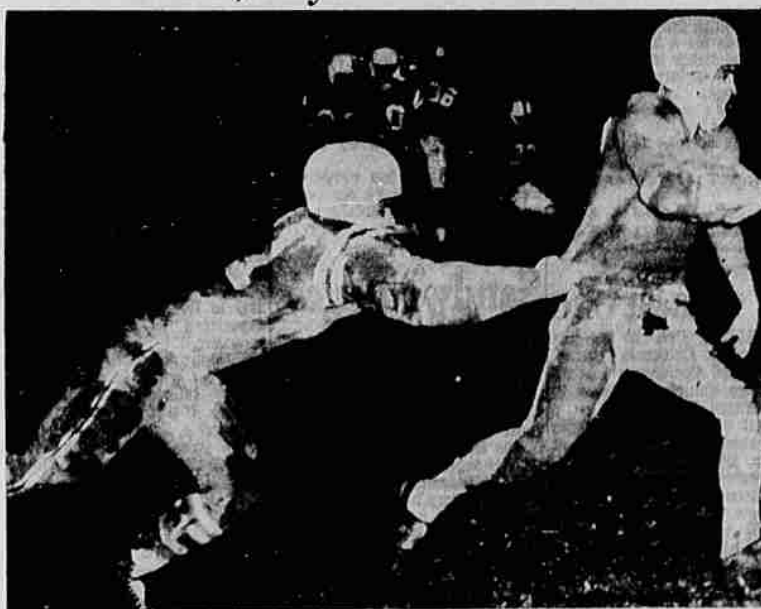

Long Runs, Trickery Defeat Bend, 26-0

Punts Run Back 72, 73 Yards For TDs

The ghost of a long-lost breakaway offense has returned to North Salem High gridders.

Missing since the opening 26-13 explosion of long runs over Franklin, the Viking speed and trickery finally had some blocking in front here Friday night and the result was an exciting 26-0 district victory over Bend.

To Coach Mel Fox and his staff it was a soothing sight to watch punt returns of 72 and 73 yards for touchdowns; two other scoring bursts of 12 and 15 yards; and three more runs of from 31 to 32 yards. Add this came from a team that had scored only 18 points in the last four games!

Drop Kick Extra Points

Two pick-em-up-and-a-day-em down kids, Herb Graves and Mike Patton, accounted for the long punt returns and a quick 13-0 lead in the first quarter. Graves, junior fullback who ran the 100 in 10.3 as a sophomore, did the honors on a 15-yard jaunt in the second period, and Jim McCaffery, a junior at halfback, spurred 12 yards for the fourth counter, in the third stanza.

Coach Fox pulled another trick out of the bag, a junior who uses the old-fashioned dropkick for extra points, Bob Reeves. Reeves, who has been out all season with an injury, made his second and fourth but had the other two blocked.

The welcome victory was North Salem's first in the district column and second of the season against two defeats and two ties.

No Closer than North 39

Bend was not up to the strength it had when the Lava Bears tied Albany, being minus the star quarterback, Danny Olsen, and about three other starters. Longest gain Bend could muster was six yards, by Bob Lanzetta in the second quarter.

Closest Bend got to pay-off territory was the Viking 39 late in the game.

In fact, the statistics were on the peculiar side all evening. With three touchdowns to their credit, the Vikings had only 27 net yards of gains by rushing and one first down!

Almost as strange, Bend out-gained North Salem in the first half, 57-30 gross yards. But those tricky reverses and some slick ball handling by Grant Todd, senior quarterback, had the Lava Bears guessing often.

Here is how the scoring was accomplished:

Got Concealed Start

Late in the first quarter, Bend punted to Graves on the North 27, who handed off to Patton on a reverse. This tactical success got Patton off to a concealed start down the left, or south, sideline and he was gone for 73 yards and six points. The time was 2:50 to go in the period.

Exactly two minutes later, Bend punted again, and the exchange was the other way around. Patton caught this one and handed off to Graves, who picked the left sideline again, his speed and change of pace
