DEAR MRS. M.: You certainly should have learned to accept the situation and adjust to it by now. Since you know you can't expect food at your mother's house, bring it along. If you expect to be hungry before departure time, carry a sandwich and thermos.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I'm 26 and am going with a married man of 40. We get along beautifully, have the same tastes and interests. He's asked me to marry him, and to go with him to see his lawyer to arrange the divorce. His wife will not consent, however. I've asked several people for advice and have gotten so many different answers that I'm confused. Penny.
