

### Three Public Hearings Due November 13

#### Planning Commission Investigates Setback Applications

Three public hearings are scheduled for the city planning commission the night of Tuesday, Nov. 13.

One is for a variance in setback lines on property at the southwest corner of 17th and Center, and the applicants are David Lear, Dwight and Margaret Lear. Another is for the establishment of setback lines on both sides of Tile road between Capitol street and the main line of the Southern Pacific, and is initiated by the commission. The third is for a zone change from R-1 residential to C-2 business in Northgate addition, and the applicant is Howard Olsen.

**Service Station Project**  
The Lear application is for a change in the established setback lines on 17th and on Center so that light poles and pump island drive areas for a service station may project into the setback areas on these streets. The present setback from the center line of Center street is 30 feet, and from the center line of 17th it is 40 feet. The property is in a C-2 business zone.

In the Tile road proposal the commission is considering a setback requirement on each side that would require all buildings, structures and signs hereafter erected or altered to be set back 20 feet, or such other distance as may be deemed appropriate, from the center line of the pavement on Tile road.

**Seeks C-2 Zone**  
Olsen's Northgate application was originally filed asking for a change to C-3 business, but because of objections raised the applicant asks an amendment in the application to make it C-2, and this will be considered at the hearing.

This acreage property is located between the main line of Stutz addition and Northgate avenue and between the west line of Greenbriar street and the C-3 zone area along the east side of highway 99E.

The application has been pending for several weeks. The purpose is to make the property available for business development.

### FPC Hearing On PNP Dams Nears Window

WASHINGTON (AP)—Opposition will be voiced Wednesday when a hearing on proposed private power dams in the Snake River enters its final phase.

The National Hells Canyon Assn. plans to present at least two witnesses at the Federal Power Commission hearing on an application by the Pacific Northwest Power Co. to build the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams.

The association advocates federal projects in the river bordering Idaho and Oregon. Its attorney, Evelyn Cooper, says the two witnesses will seek to prove that the PNP proposal would not be in the public interest because it would not be "best adapted to a comprehensive river development plan."

FPC counsel John C. Mason will have FPC engineers available to testify Nov. 15.

FPC examiner Edward B. Marsh held field hearings on PNP's dam construction license application in Oregon and Idaho last June. PNP presented 15 witnesses at a hearing here July 24-Aug. 17.

Witnesses, from government agencies testified during the next phase, held Sept. 24-Oct. 1.

### Tenants Flee Basement Fire

PORTLAND (AP)—Tenants of a five-story apartment building in northwest Portland were chased out by fire and smoke Saturday, but damage was estimated at only \$5,500.

Firemen confined the blaze to a basement storage room. They said flames broke out there because combustibles had been left too near a light bulb. Smoke swirling upstairs caused most of the damage.

Two guinea pigs and a bird died.

### Pre-Legislative Meeting Stated

A series of pre-legislative meetings for budget and public building discussions have been scheduled in various parts of the state with the meeting in this area set for December 6 at 4:30 p.m. at the Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

Newspaper editors and political writers have been invited to participate in the discussions.

The meeting at Monmouth will be attended by representatives of Marion, Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook counties. The first meeting of the series will be at noon November 26 at the Southern Oregon College of Education for representatives of Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Curry counties.
