Three public hearings are sched-uled for the city planning com-mission the night of Tuesday, Nov. 13.

One is for a variance in setback

lines on property at the southwest corner of 17th and Center, and the applicants are David Lear, Dwight and Margaret Lear. Another is for the establishment of selback lines on both sides of Tile road between Capitol street and the main line of the Southern Pacific, and is initiated by the commission. The Lear application is for a
change in the established setback
ines on 17th and on Center so that light poles and pump island drive areas for a service station may project into the setback areas on these streets. The present setback from the center line of Center street is 50 feet, and from the center line of 17th it is 40 feet. The property is in a C - 2 business zone.

In the Tile road proposal the commission is considering a set-buck requirement on each side

commission is considering a sei-back requirement on each side that would require all buildings, structures and signs hereafter erected or altered to be set back 30 feet, or such other distance as may be deemed appropriate, from the center line of the payement on Tile soul.

Seeks C-2 Zone
Olsen's Northgate application as originally filed asked for a change to C-3 business, but because of objections raised the applicant asks an amendment in the application to make it C-2, and this will be considered at the hearing.

This acreage property is located between the north line of Stortz addition and Northgate avenue and between the west line of Greenbriar street and the C - 3 zone area along the east side of highway 99E.

FPCHearing On PNP Dams Nears Windup

WASHINGTON 16 — Opposition will be voiced Wednesday when a hearing on proposed private power dams in the Snake River enters its final phase.

The National Hells Canyon Assn. plans to present at least two witnesses at the Federal Power Commission hearing on an application by the Pacific Northwest Power Co. to build the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams. The association advocates federal projects in the river bordering Idaho and Oregon, Its attorney, Evelyn Cooper, says the two witnesses will seek to prove that the PNP proposal would not be in the public interest because it would not be "best adapted in a comprehensive river development plan."

FPC counsel John C. Mason will have FPC engineers available to testify Nov. 10.
FPC examiner Edward B. Marsh held field hearings on PNP's dam construction license application in Oregon and Idaho last June. PNP presented 15 witnesses at a hearing here July 24-Aug. 17.
