Today's Menu

THANKSGIVING DINNER

This hot bread can go into the oven after the turkey comes out. Remember that a roasted bird should "rest" for 15 to 20 minutes before it's carved.

Ingredients: 1 cup sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 egg, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 cup yellow cornmeal, 1 cup cooled cooked rice, butter.

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Beat egg with rotary beater (hand or electric) until thick and lemon colored. Add milk, cornmeal, rice and sifted dry ingredients; mix thoroughly. Turn into 2 thoroughly buttered 8-inch layer cake pans. Bake in moderate (325 degrees) oven about 15 minutes or until bread pulls away from sides of pans. Turn one layer out on a plate and spread generously with soft butter; top with second layer; spread top with soft butter. Serve at once. Makes 8 large or 12 medium sized servings.
