Claim Envoy From Hungary Soviet Citizen

VIENNA (UP)—A former official of the Hungarian Foreign Ministry said today that Peter Kos, the Hungarian minister to Washington, is a Russian-born Soviet citizen. The charge was made by Laszlo Helmecky, a political expert in the Hungary-America section of the Hungarian Foreign Ministry until he fled to freedom in Austria last week.

Kos, in addition to being minister to Washington, has been Hungary's chief delegate to the United Nations since May 30, 1956. When the Hungarian rebellion installed Tivadar Nagy as premier, one of Nagy's first actions was to dismiss Kos from the foreign ministry. Kos won back his job when Janos Kadar took over the premiership from Nagy with Soviet backing.

Here in Russia Helmecky said it was a well-known fact in the Hungarian ministry that Kos was born in Russia and still is a Soviet citizen. He said Kos' Russian name is Lew Konduktov.

Helmecky said Kos replaced Karoly Szarka as minister in Washington because Szarka failed miserably to win Hungarian immigrants to the United States over to Communist activities. Szarka was recalled to Budapest and is now deputy foreign minister in the Kadar government.

Helmecky said that while Szarka was minister in Washington the Budapest government pressed him constantly to "produce results" among the Hungarian immigrants. Eventually, criticism of his failure on this score became so strong he was recalled, Helmecky said.

Hedges on Questions Helmecky said Kos was believed to be the main agent and contact man of the Soviet Politburo (ruling circle of the Communist Party) in the Hungarian Foreign Ministry.

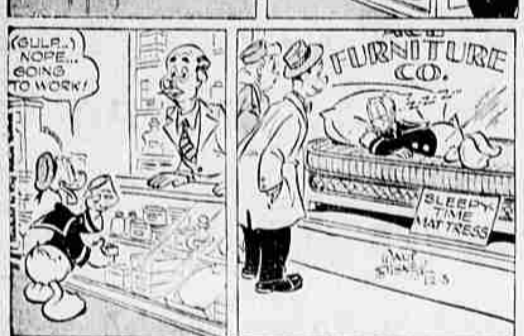
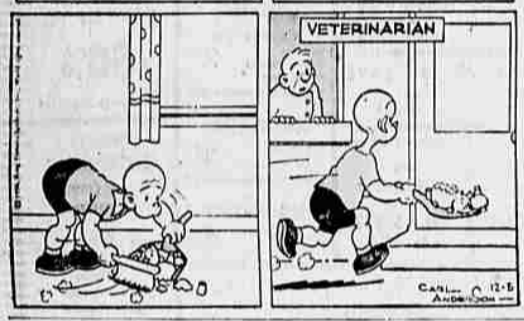
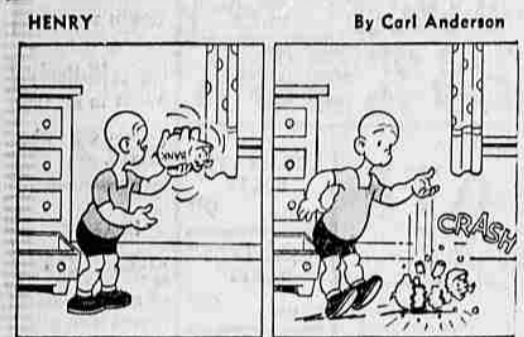
