CHERRY NUT MOUNDS

Ingredients: 2 cups sifted enriched flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon almond extract, 2 eggs (separated), 1 cup butter or margarine (at room temperature), 2 cups rolled oats (quick or old-fashioned), 1 cup chopped nut-meats, 4 candied cherries.

Method: Sift together flour, sugar and salt into bowl. Add almond extract, egg yolks and butter; beat until smooth. Stir in oats. Form into 4 dozen small balls. Dip each ball into slightly beaten egg whites; roll in chopped nutmeats. Make a hollow in each ball; place ball a candied cherry in each hollow. Bake on greased cookie sheets in slow (325 degrees) oven 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 4 dozen cookies.
