Miss Trindle Dies Following Long Illness

Services Saturday for Well-Known Teacher, Home Economist

Funeral services will be held Saturday for Miss Eleanor Trindle, an associate professor at Oregon State college and a former teacher at Salem high school, who died Thursday at a Salem hospital after an illness of six months.

The 3 p.m. services will be held in the Clough-Barrick chapel, Dr. Brooks Moore of the First Methodist church officiating. Interment will be in the City View cemetery.

Miss Trindle, a native of Salem, was born April 9, 1915. She was the daughter of the late William Trindle who died last June.

She was a graduate of Salem high school and attended Willamette university and Oregon State, graduating from OSC. She received her master's degree in education from the Teachers college at Columbia university in 1955.

Miss Trindle was also Marion county home demonstration agent in the late 1940's. During the war she served as hostess for the Service club No. 2 at Camp Adair. Later she worked on the County Welfare commission.

She was a member of the PEO Sisterhood.

Survivors include her mother, Mrs. William Trindle, 1965 S. Commercial; brother, William Trindle Jr., North Willow; sister, Mrs. Helen Reitzer, Portland; aunts, Mrs. Leone Gookins and Mrs. Mildred Kittelson, both of Salem, and Mrs. Ethel Rucker of San Francisco; and five nephews.

Crosby Seeks Quick Trial

A court proceeding to compel an immediate trial in the Multnomah county circuit court for Clyde Crosby was filed in the state supreme court by his attorneys Wednesday.

Crosby was among those indicated by the Multnomah county grand jury in the recent vice investigations.

Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton, who was directed by Gov. Elmo Smith to prosecute these cases, said Thursday he would oppose Crosby's mandamus proceedings pending a decision of the Arizona supreme court as to the legality of a law under which Crosby sought to erase a 20-year-old second degree burglary conviction in that state.

Test of the legality of this law, Thornton said, would be filed by Arizona's attorney general.

Judge Dismisses Action Against William Mitchell

On motion of the district attorney, District Judge Edward O. Stadter Friday dismissed the case of the state against William Hugh Mitchell because Mitchell is doing time in the penitentiary and is considered a good rehabilitation prospect.

The complaint charged him with larceny by baillee of an automobile belonging to the Valley Motor Co. After this charge was filed he was convicted on a charge in Jackson county and sentenced to the state prison, the sentencing court at the time being aware of the charge against him here.

In the penitentiary, says the district attorney's motion, Mitchell has shown improvement and "it is felt that he can be rehabilitated upon his release from the penitentiary, and that it would be in the best interests of justice to dismiss this complaint."

West Coast Phone Rate Hike Gets Approval of PUC

A rate increase totaling \$32,000 a year has been granted the West Coast Telephone Co. in an order issued by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel. The rate boost amounts to about 5 per cent.

Heltzel said denial of the increase would have resulted to confiscation and would have been unlawful. The increase becomes effective Jan. 1.

About 80 per cent of the company patrons will get increases amounting to approximately 30 cents a month. Of the \$32,000 added revenue, \$18,000 will be paid in taxes, leaving the company an annual net revenue increase of \$149,000.

The company's district offices are located in Beaverton, La Grande, Coos Bay and Klamath Falls.
