STEAMED MOLASSES PUDDING
Ingredients: 1 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine melted, 1/2 cup dark molasses, 1/2 cup seedless raisins drained in hot water and drained, 1/2 cup coarsely chopped Brazil nuts.
Method: Sift together the flour, baking soda, cinnamon and nutmeg. Beat egg until thick and lemon colored; beat in sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, then milk, melted butter and molasses. Beat in sifted dry ingredients just until smooth. Fold in raisins and Brazil nuts. Turn into well-greased 1-quart mold; grease mold cover and lock in place. Place pudding on rack in steamer; add enough boiling water so it covers bottom half of mold. Cover steamer; steam 1 hour. Remove pudding from steamer, open and insert cake tester in center. If tester does not come out clean, cover pudding, return to steamer and steam another 15 minutes. (Water should boil gently during entire steaming). Serve hot with Hard Sauce. Makes 6 large or 12 small servings. If pudding is made ahead, remove from mold, cool, cover tightly and refrigerate. Reheat over boiling water, allowing about 3 hour.
