

Soviet Claims British Detain Ship's Doctor

Both Nations Agree He Is Patient in Mental Hospital

LONDON—The Moscow radio claims a Soviet ship's doctor who quit his vessel is being held in Britain against his will.

Both agree the doctor, identified only as Biryukov, is in a mental hospital. The Moscow broadcast last night claimed this is the reason.

"Having failed to force Biryukov to stay in Britain and seeking to cover up their traces, the British secret police are obviously trying to make out that Biryukov is a lunatic."

The broadcast added that Soviet Ambassador Jacob Malik had protested to the Foreign Office and demanded his immediate release.

The Foreign Office acknowledged that Biryukov is at the hospital but said he applied for asylum and asked to be spared any visit by Soviet officials.

Biryukov left his ship at Hull Dec. 22. London newspapers said the doctor barricaded himself in a hotel room after being questioned by intelligence agents.

Biryukov "stamped up and down his room, banging the walls and shouting" throughout the night of Jan. 5. The hotel management called police, but he wouldn't let them in.

When the police entered, Biryukov dropped 15 feet from a window to the lawn below. His wrists and neck had been slashed, and he was taken to the hospital.

Hungary Reds Admit Holding Camerawoman

BUDAPEST—Hungarian Communist authorities have acknowledged that Mrs. Georgette Meyer Chapelle, American freelance photographer, has been held incommunicado for over a month.

A native of Milwaukee, Mrs. Chapelle had been working on pictures of Hungarian refugees for Life magazine.

She left her Vienna hotel early in December, telling the room clerk she would be back in three days. Later she was reported to have been picked up by the Communists Dec. 15.

Recently the American legation said it had been trying to get the Hungarians to say if they had her in custody.

Dewey Represents Producer in Row Over Stage Role Switch

NEW YORK—Former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will represent the producer of the Broadway hit "My Fair Lady" in a squabble over a vacation replacement for Rex Harrison, male star of the musical.

The dispute centers on the Actors Equity Assn's objection to assignment of the role of Prof. Higgins to Irish actor Edward Mulhare.

Actors Equity, a union of performing artists, bases its opposition on the ground that Mulhare is an alien and has no unique talent for the role.

The show's producer, Herman Levin, in announcing yesterday the retention of Dewey, now a Manhattan lawyer, said the former New York governor would handle "my action that may result" from Mulhare's hiring.

A spokesman for Levin, meanwhile, termed as "spectacularly unlikely" reports that Dewey would receive a fee of \$50,000.

Harrison leaves the show Feb. 4 to begin a four-week vacation. Levin said he hired Mulhare "after a year's search in which we auditioned dozens of players."

Mulhare is due to begin rehearsing for the role either today or tomorrow, Levin said. An Equity official voiced immediate opposition to the rehearsal plan, contending Mulhare's contract has not been registered with Equity.

Actors Equity contends that while Harrison is a British subject his replacement would have to be either an Equity member or a foreign player of equal rank.

Levin has threatened to sue Actors Equity for damages if it tries to close the play, which has been a sellout for months.

Midwest-East Weather Again Bitterly Cold

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS A frigid blast of arctic air sent the mercury plummeting to sub-zero readings across most of the Midwest and Northeast early today.

Below zero readings—some of them the lowest of the season—extended from the Northern Plains across the Great Lakes and from New York state into New England.

Chicago notched its lowest temperature since February 1955 when the thermometer registered -6 early today.

Bismarck, N. D., had -21, International Falls, Minn., recorded -17, Grand Rapids, Wis., -20, Burlington, Iowa, -15, Syracuse, N. Y., -11, Massena, N. Y., -35, Watertown, N. Y., -24, Albany, N. Y., -39, and in New England, Burlington, Vt., reported -21 and Lebanon, N. H., had -20.

Chilly air spread into all except the southern edge of the country east of the Rocky Mountains. Temperatures along the Gulf Coast and in Florida remained in the 30s and 40s.

Snow which blanketed much of the Ohio Valley in the past 24 hours has moved eastward toward the Atlantic Coast.

McCarthy Hits At President's 'Palace Guard'

WASHINGTON—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) says that "if let alone" President Eisenhower might do a fairly good job.

But, McCarthy said last night, "I think the motley crowd around him—the so-called palace guard—are doing this nation a great deal of damage."

McCarthy, who sometimes has been critical of the Eisenhower administration and the President himself, expressed these sentiments in a televised interview.

The Wisconsin Senator mentioned, as being among the "motley crowd," Paul Hoffman, C. D. Jackson and Sherman Adams, Eisenhower's top aide.

Millon Eisenhower, the President's brother, "tops the list," McCarthy said, adding: "He has the President's ear. I don't think he's any more a Republican than you are a Hotentot."

None of those mentioned by McCarthy was immediately available for comment.

In response to a question, McCarthy indicated he does not expect Eisenhower's support when he seeks reelection next year. "We are not on a 'Dear Ike' and 'Dear Joe' basis," he added.

McCarthy announced during the program that he and his wife, Jean, had adopted a five-week-old girl from a New York foundling home.

Spies Nabbed In No. Korea

TOKYO—"Armed agents" of the United States and South Korea have been captured and tried for attempting to foment Hungarian-type uprisings in North Korea, a Communist newspaper reported today.

According to the semi-official North Korean publication, the spies were tried at North Whangha Provincial Court.

The charge of being American agents has been used in the past for almost anyone of Korean origin tried in North Korea for activities against the state.
