The thrill of having one of his snapshots selected for the cover picture on the church magazine is one of the happy memories of Rev. Alfred G. Jamieson, pastor of First Evangelical United Brethren church, Marion at North Summer street, since August 1952.

However, the young pastor admits photography has been very much curtailed for him because of the expense. He likes to go with his family in the car for rambles through the less populated areas of the west coast taking a camping outfit along so they will not be dependant upon hotels or motels when night comes.

Born in Iowa, Rev. Jamieson left that midwest state while still so young he has no memories of his parents homesteaded in the Madras country and later went to northern California.

It was at Redding, Calif., that the Salem pastor completed his high school work and then he was in Oregon again. He attended Portland Bible Institute which later became Cascade College. After three years there he earned his diploma and while there he served the Canby church.

Transferred to Florence in 1941 he was there for a short time before being stationed at the Millwaukie church. Being back near Portland he was able to continue work at Cascade college and received his bachelor of theology there. Later he received his masters degree from Puget Sound.

The war years were spent by the Jamiesons at a church in Tacoma which brought them in the near vicinity of the army camps and installations.

Only child Jamieson, the son and Philip of the Salem pastor and his wife, is a freshman this year at Seattle Pacific college. The Salem pastor believes his education acquired in so many different places and many times under difficult circumstances has by that fact been of greater value to him.

The Jamieson family lives at 1124 N. Summer St., several blocks from the Marion street church location.

Oregon Council of Churches Schedule Convocation Here

A series of seminars on legislative matters of interest to ministers and laymen throughout Oregon will highlight the fourth annual convocation of the Oregon Council of Churches at First Methodist church, Salem, January 22 to 24.

Several members of the legislature will be present at 3:20 p.m., Wednesday and Thursday to give their views and answer questions of delegates on a wide range of subjects. Dr. Julian Keiser, First Congregational Church, Salem, is chairman for these sessions.

Council business sessions and reports are scheduled at 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., Wednesday, when new officers and board members will be elected and the 1957 budget adopted. Dr. Ross J. Griffith, president of Northwest Christian College at Eugene, is the president of the Council.

The principal educational feature of the convocation will be four workshops scheduled at 9 a.m., Wednesday and 1:30 p.m., Thursday. They will be on "Problems of the Urban Church," led by Rev. Joseph Merchant, executive director of the department of the urban church of the National Council of Churches; "The Church and the Older People," by Mrs. Clifford Zollinger, Portland, authority on the problem of aged people; "The Role of the Church in a Secular Age," by Mark Smith, administrator of the fair employment practices law of the Oregon bureau of labor; and "The Bible in the Church and Community," by Dr. Gerald A. Larue, field executive of the National Council of Churches, Division of Christian Education.

The convocation will open at 1 p.m., Tuesday with registration and committee meetings. At 4 p.m., there will be a reception for Dr. Harold A. Bosley, Evanston, Ill., who will speak at night worship services Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, as well as Thursday morning.

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
