

Morse to Fight Try to Reduce 3 Sisters Area

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (D-Ore) will carry into Congress the fight for the Three Sisters wilderness area of Oregon if the Department of Agriculture attempts to cut the size of the area.

Morse announced that Friday. He said he had received a letter from E. L. Peterson, assistant secretary of Agriculture, in which Peterson said he would oppose further hearings on the matter "because we have at hand the facts necessary to make a carefully considered decision."

Morse said in reply that Peterson's letter indicated the decision would "alter the status of the substantial area west of Horse Creek."

"If this implication is borne out by your announcement, those of us who oppose such action will have to do what we can in Congress to counteract such a decision in order to protect the Three Sisters wilderness area and to achieve a sound and predictable program for these areas throughout the country," Morse said.

Last month Morse asked Peterson to make no decision on the boundary matter for a year so that discussions could be carried on with interested parties, including conservationists who oppose the reduction.

Record Wheat Yield Reported

PENDLETON (AP) — An all-time record yield of 37.7 bushels of wheat per acre was harvested by Umatilla County farmers in 1956, reported Victor W. Johnson, county extension agent.

The previous record per-acre yield was 35.1 bushels per acre in 1948.

Approximately 196,000 acres of the county's acreage allotment of 196,359 acres were cut during the 1956 harvest, Johnson said.

Total wheat production for the year was 6,771,500 bushels, well below the all-time record. Since the allotment program has been in effect about 70,000 acres of the county's wheat land has been removed from production of that crop.

Status of Western European Communist Parties at New Low

Action of Soviet Union Shatters Organizations

By NORMAN RUNNION, United Press Staff Correspondent LONDON (UP) — "This is serious," the Daily Worker warned, "This is no false alarm, it is grim reality."

The British Communist newspaper was talking about the drop in circulation. It said that well have meant the status of Western European Communism in general.

For a year, the Soviet Union has systematically — and intentionally — been shattering the ranks of Europe's Communist parties. First, it was de-Stalinization, now it is re-Stalinization.

The results have shown in mass resignations, in election results, in the sad financial straits of party newspapers and the freedom uprisings in Poland and Hungary.

The Worker released no circulation figures. But there is little doubt that its daily sale in recent months has dropped by the hundreds — possibly thousands.

No official figures have been released on the circulation of the Worker or party membership since Russian troops crushed the Hungarian revolt.

Brooks Postal Receipts Up

BROOKS (Special) — Postal receipts of 16 Brooks postoffice increased 24.4 per cent during 1956 over the year 1955, with gross receipts of \$26,507.45, for letter cancellations and parcel post. Parcel Post showed more increase than letter mail.

The postmaster, Elmer Egan, had a stroke some weeks ago, and at present is convalescing at his home. It is expected he will be back at work in about a month. In his absence his wife is in charge.

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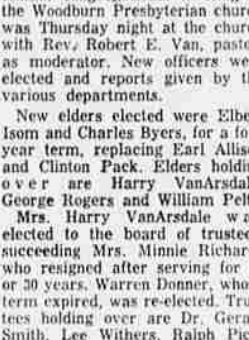
