# Highlights of Ike's Inaugural Message

WASHINGTON (AP)—Highlights of President Eisenhower's second term inaugural address: We live in a land of plenty, but rarely has this earth known such peril as today.

In too much of the earth there is want, discord, danger, new forces and new nations stir and strive across the earth, with power to bring, by their fate, great good or great evil to the free world's future.

The divisive force is international Communism and the power that it controls.

Yet the world of international Communism has itself been shaken by a fierce and mighty force: the readiness of men who love freedom to pledge their lives to that love.

We look upon this shaken earth, and we declare our firm and fixed purpose—the building of a peace with justice in a world where moral law prevails.

We are called to meet the price of this peace, of those who seek to rule by force, we must pay the costs of our own needed military strength, and help to build the security of others.

We recognize and accept our own deep involvement in the destiny of men everywhere. We are accordingly pledged to honor, and to strive to fortify, the authority of the United Nations.

# Silverton Jersey Tops County Cows in 1956 DHIA Testing

Bonnie, a beautiful 10-year-old purebred Jersey cow owned by James Phillips, Silverton, yielded 16,130 pounds of milk and 629.3 pounds of butterfat to become the highest producing cow in the Marion County Dairy Herd Improvement association for 1956.

Her mark is highest among 2,620 cows in 60 herds tested during the year and is topped only by the 1954 production of Seniorsia, a Guernsey cow owned by A. J. Minke Jr., Mount Angel.

Phillips herd top producer Phillips' herd of 37 animals was the best producing herd in the association with an average of 9,978 pounds of milk and 366.4 pounds of butterfat per cow on 303-day test.

Other herds averaging more than 500 pounds of butterfat were William Vogt, Salem, 24 registered Jersey cows, 9,614 pounds of milk, 324.6 pounds of butterfat; James Daugherty, Woodburn, 31 registered Jersey cows, 9,421 milk, 306 butterfat; Buford & Orville Brown, Woodburn, 24 registered Jersey cows, 10,237 milk, 366 butterfat.

MacLaren School for Boys, Woodburn, had the two high producing two year old animals, both registered Jerseys. Beulah gave 10,316 pounds of milk, 397 pounds of butterfat; Rebecca yielded 10,790 milk, 360 butterfat. A total of 14 cows in the two year old group led under 500 pounds or more of butterfat.

Holstein Top 3-Year-Old An unnamed Holstein in the herd of Staccato Bros., Aurora, led the three years with 17,500 pounds of milk and 721 of butterfat. Her closest rival, Colantha, owned by a Marcus Wampack of Mount Angel, led 584.3 pounds of butterfat. There were 34 in the three year old list producing 500 pounds or more.

Oregon State Penitentiary owned the leading four year old cow who was also second high among all cows tested. She was a Holstein, No. 24, with 21,600 pounds of milk and 325.5 pounds of butterfat. Rascette Bros. came in second with 17,400 milk and 607.5 butterfat.

# Bids for Gas, Oil Increase

Members of the Marion county court expressed the hope that next winter will be a mild one after a single bid for the courthouse supply of fuel oil had been opened Monday.

The single bid by Union Oil Co. was \$3.65 per 42-gallon barrel. A year ago the low bid was \$3.08.

The commissioners and oil company representatives alike expressed surprise that there was not more interest in the fuel bid.

The cost of gasoline under a low bid of 20.53 cents per gallon by Standard Oil is approximately one cent higher than a year ago.

There were three bids for the county's supply of road building oil and all were identical a and higher. The price range was from \$27 to \$29.75, depending upon the quality. Last year's basic price was \$23.50.

All bids, including those for kerosene, lubricating oils and gear grease were taken under study by the court.
