Rich, crumbly stuffing for a small-size capon.  
Roast Capon with Stuffing

- ROAST CAPON WITH STUFFING**  
Ingredients: 4 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1 medium-sized onion (finely diced), 1/4 cup diced celery, 1 cup coarse dry bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper, 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 2 tablespoons chopped pecans or chestnuts, 1 small capon (about 4 pounds ready-to-cook weight).
- Method: Melt butter over low heat in skillet; add onion and celery; cook until onion is golden brown, stirring often. Mix with bread crumbs, salt, pepper to taste, poultry seasoning and nutmeat; stuff mixture into body cavity of capon. Close opening with skewers and string or sew together with thread. Roast according to standard directions.
