FAMILY LUNCH

Good moist loaf to use at home and send along in lunch boxes. Fish Chowder Pilot Crackers Deviled Egg Salad Nut Brown Bread

NUT BROWN BREAD

Ingredients: 3 cups sifted flour, 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup firmly-packed dark brown sugar, 1/4 cup undiluted evaporated milk, 2 tablespoons grated orange rind, 3/4 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup dark molasses, 1 cup coarsely broken walnuts.

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and brown sugar. (If sugar is lumpy, push through strainer or roll to make smooth before sifting.) Stir together the undiluted evaporated milk, orange rind, orange juice and molasses in a large mixing bowl. Add the sifted dry ingredients; stir just enough to blend. Fold in walnuts. Turn into well greased loaf pan (9 by 5 by 3 inches). Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven about 1 hour. Loosen loaf from sides of pan with spatula or knife; turn out on rack to cool. Store in tightly covered container.
