## California Defeats Tribe in Overtime

### Bears Remain Undefeated; Cougars Win, 87-81, as Ducks' Franklin Sets Free Throw Record

 Unbeaten California needed overtime Friday night to ruin Stanford's "spoiler" reputation in Pacific Coast Conference basketball—but it took two teams from the bottom of the standings to furnish the "recorder" performance.

California became the first team to beat the Indians twice in conference play this season by spearing out a 67-64 overtime story. Earlier, the surprising Stanford team had split with tough teams from Oregon State and Washington.

Washington defeated Oregon State, 64-53, Friday night for its sixth win in seven starts, but the cellar battle between Washington State and Oregon crumbled records as the Cougars won, 87-81.

 Oregon Tech clung to its lead in the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball race Friday night by walling Oregon College of Education, 73-48.

Eastern Oregon remained one game behind as it downed Portland State, 62-59.

The Techmen, playing on their home floor at Klamath Falls, took a 36-25 halftime lead and widened the margin in the closing period. Forward Jerry Fasteen set the pace with 20 points.

Eastern Oregon also was on its home floor as it overcame a 36-26 halftime lead by Portland State. The Mountaineers caught up after four minutes of play in the second half, and never were headed again. Guard Larry Howard led the victors with 20 points.

The teams will meet again Saturday night.

of UCLA and totaled 36 points, but Oregon's all-time individual scoring mark set by Jim Loscut-off.

But Franklin was pushed all the way. Larry Beck of WSC hit 17 free throws to tie the Neulls' old record and totaled 33 points.

Washington plays Oregon State again tonight, while Washington State tangled with Oregon. Stanford, the only other PCC team that will see action, plays Santa Clara in a nonconference game.

California nearly lost its 12th position in the national standings after holding a good lead through most of the game. Then Stanford rallied to take its first lead at 61-59 with 25 seconds remaining. Cal's Larry Friend tied the game with five seconds to go.

The Indians jumped to a three-point lead in the overtime period, but the Bears powered back with six straight to maintain their hold on first place in the PCC.

Doug Smart and Bruno Bion, Washington's pair of giants, kept the Huskies ahead of Oregon State nearly all the way. Smart scored 22 points, while Bion hit for 17. Bob Alard was high for the Bears with 16.

**Cal Heads Standings**

The WSC-Oregon game wasn't a see-saw struggle, despite the scoring battle between Franklin and Beck. The Ducks took the lead only briefly in the second half, and the Cougars came back strong in their bid to give the Ducks the cellar.

The present standings: California 6-0, UCLA 4-0, Washington 6-1, Oregon State 2-3, USC 1-3, Idaho 1-4, and Oregon 1-4.

The University of San Francisco returns to the wars tonight in a test against the San Francisco Club, while other members of the California Basketball Association are traveling. St. Mary's plays Brigham Young, College of Pacific meets Nevada, Pepperdine plays San Diego State, and Fresno State goes against Los Angeles.

## Machen Wants Title Fight

**MIAMI BEACH, Fla.**—Less than three years after he launched his professional boxing career young Eddie Machen of Redding, Calif., believes he is ready to meet heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson.

"I think I could fight Patterson now," the 24-year-old Machen told sports writers Friday night after he had pounded his way to a unanimous 10-round decision over Joey Maxim, the former light-heavyweight champ and the only man who ever beat Patterson.

"But my next move is to my manager (Sid Flaherty)," Machen added. "I'll do whatever he says."

Already the No. 2 contender in the heavyweight division, Machen now has won 20 straight professional fights by knockouts.

The quick-handed Californian almost made Maxim his 15th victim.

Still one of the ring's great boxers, the pudgy, 34-year-old Maxim held Machen away for six rounds with his elusive, jabbing style. By the seventh, Machen had him figured.

## 7-3 Ring Giant May Be Boxer To Boost Gate

The big attraction needed to draw boxing fans to the Salem Armory may be on hand.

He's big, all right, and has tremendous hands. He is Ewart Potgieter, who has grown in his 24 years to be 7 feet 3 inches tall and 335 pounds—a heavyweight, to be sure.

The South African arrived at Portland Thursday with his manager, Capt. John Elft, to place himself in the hands of promoters Tommy Moyer and Sid Flaherty. Flaherty has been manager of such as Bobo Olson and Eddie Machen.

Potgieter will train in Vancouver for the Feb. 16 bout in Salem against an unnamed opponent. That will be a Saturday night. Then he will fight in Portland and Eugene.

Moyer reported that Potgieter fought in Boston two weeks ago when not in good shape. He has lost only one of 13 bouts, having a record of nine straight victories. Moyer said. He also has a draw with James Parker of England, who fought Archie Moore last summer. Moyer added.

Potgieter is the giant who once was refused permission to box in the United States because of a glandular ailment, but Moyer said that an operation took care of that. He will get in good condition before his first bout here, Moyer continued.
