Congress Might Skip Session To Avoid Message from Tito

 about 10 days during the Easter holiday season. This year, the President Tito of Yugoslavia visits the United States, despite mounting protests. Congress may arrange to be out of session to avoid inviting him to address it. Customarily, when heads of foreign states visit Washington, Congress issues such speaking invitations to them.
 But some leaders suggested today Congress might lengthen its customary Easter recess so it would be out of town while Tito is here.
 Although there has been no official announcement, there have been indications from diplomatic quarters that Tito will visit the United States — as a guest of President Eisenhower — some time in April.
