VIETNAMESE COFFEE CAKE
Ingredients: 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 cup warm (around 100 degrees) water, 1 package active dry yeast, 2 eggs (well beaten), 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 cup seedless raisins (rinsed in hot water and drained), 2 tablespoons grated orange rind.
Method: Beat butter and 1/2 cup of the quart mold or baking dish. Sprinkle with fine dry bread crumbs. Scald milk, stir in sugar and butter, cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a bowl; sprinkle in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and eggs; mix thoroughly. Add raisins by far about 5 minutes; cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1 1/2 hours. Turn out on greased 1 1/2 quart mold; oven at 350 minutes.
