Late Indian Rally Nets 68-52 Win

Gambee Scores 15 Of 20 at Half, Then Stopped

The underdog Oregon State Beavers will try for the "spoiler" role Saturday night as they go up against UCLA in the finale of a two-game Pacific Coast Conference basketball series.

The sturdy Bruins, who share the conference lead with undefeated California, set several league records Friday night as they thumped the Beavers, 59-37. They will try to top them Saturday night.

The Bruin victory Friday night was the 32nd consecutive win in regular season games, the 21st

straight, playoffs included; the fifth straight this season in the PCC, and the 10th straight this year against all opposition.

Stanford beat Oregon, 68-52, at Eugene in the only other conference game Friday night.

Utahns Defense OSC
At Los Angeles, UCLA's defense was entirely too much for OSC and the Bruins won just about as they pleased. Coach Slat's Gill's team seemed to be wholly reliant upon big forward Dave Gambee, and when the Bruins stopped him they bottled the Oregon State attack. OSC hit but 10 baskets in 62 attempts, and it was 7 minutes 49 seconds before their first one went through.

UCLA's passing was just about faultless and the team had far too much speed for the much bigger but slower footed invaders.

Oregon Tied at 45-All
Cellar-dwelling Oregon made things uncomfortably close for Stanford until about 11 minutes before the final whistle. At this juncture Oregon hit a scoring drought. The count was 45-45 when the Webfoots went into a nosebleed from which they didn't recover. Stanford seized upon it to drive a wedge for a comparatively easy victory.

Bill Boyd, Stanford forward, as usual led the Indian attack. He poured in 23 points, but Oregon's versatile Charlie Franklin kept pace with 23. Stanford had a 29-20 lead at halftime.

Oregon has won only one game in seven starts, while Stanford has won three and lost four.

North Carolina Could Lose Out
Top-ranked Tar Heels Could Miss NCAA On League Vote

Looks as if those North Carolina Tar Heels might get some competition yet before the Atlantic Coast Conference season—or post season—ends.

Conference whippings in their second and third games, way back in December, probably cost Wake Forest any chance for the regular season ACC title. But the league picks its delegate to the NCAA tournament in a post-season tourney and by that time the Deacons might take a good deal of handling.

They're rolling now, having raised their current streak to seven in a row and 14 of their last 15 with an 81-70 whipping of Clemson last night. It was their fifth straight conference victory, meaning they went into a second place tie with Duke, each 5-2, compared to North Carolina's 6-0 slate. The Tar Heels, top-ranked nationally, have eight league games left. Wake Forest seven.

The true test will come Feb. 13 and again Feb. 26 when Wake Forest plays the Tar Heels. In a previous meeting, North Carolina defeated the Deacons, 63-55.

Tulane defeated Mississippi 66-65 to stay close to Kentucky and Auburn in the Southeastern Conference race. West Virginia routed St. Johns of Brooklyn 105-72 and fifth-ranked UCLA defeated Oregon State 59-37 to stretch its Pacific Coast Conference winning streak to 32.

Mississippi State defeated Louisiana State 81-72 in another SEC game and Tulsa won a Missouri Valley Conference test from Houston 78-50. Virginia Military routed its first Southern Conference game, 75-60 over Davidson, and The Citadel edged Presbyterian 65-63.

UO Ducklings Defeat Rooks
EUGENE (Special)—The undefeated Oregon Frosh chalked up their seventh basketball win here Friday night as they dumped the Oregon State Rooks, 76-68.

For the Rooks it was the fifth consecutive defeat.

Chuck Back, former Jefferson of Portland star, led the Frosh with 24 points while Joe Mann, the 6-7 center from Irigon, dropped in 23 for the Rooks.

Dale Jones of the Frosh and Bruce Patterson of the Rooks, both South Salem grads, were second for their teams with 18 each.

The Frosh led the lead throughout the second half after posting a 36-31 lead at the intermission. The game was tied ten times before the winners grabbed a 24-23 margin.

Seattle Team Pulls Upset
SEATTLE (AP)—A successful foul shot with six seconds to go gave Seattle Pacific a 66-65 upset basketball victory over Gonzaga of Spokane Friday night.

The hometown Falcons trailed, 33-39, at the half but began to click after the intermission and after wiping out the deficit matched the Bulldogs basket for basket. Substitute guard Don Hughes' free throw as the clock was running out gave the win to the Falcons.

Seattle Pacific's Max Jerman topped the scoring with 27 points.

Isaac Logart Defeats Bahama
NEW YORK (AP)—Isaac Logart, a Cuban with a burning desire to wear the welterweight title robes once worn by his fellow countryman, Kid Gavilan, has a speed past another opponent.

Friday night it was Yama Bahama, a 135-pounder from Bimini in the Bahamas who is neither a full fledged welter or middleweight. The decision for Logart was unanimous at Madison Square Garden after 10 rounds.

Portland Pilots Get Narrow Win
DENVER (UP)—Forward Gene Kutsch scored a field goal with 58 seconds left to play to give University of Portland a 78-76 victory over Regis last night in the first of a six-game Pilot basketball swing through the Midwest.

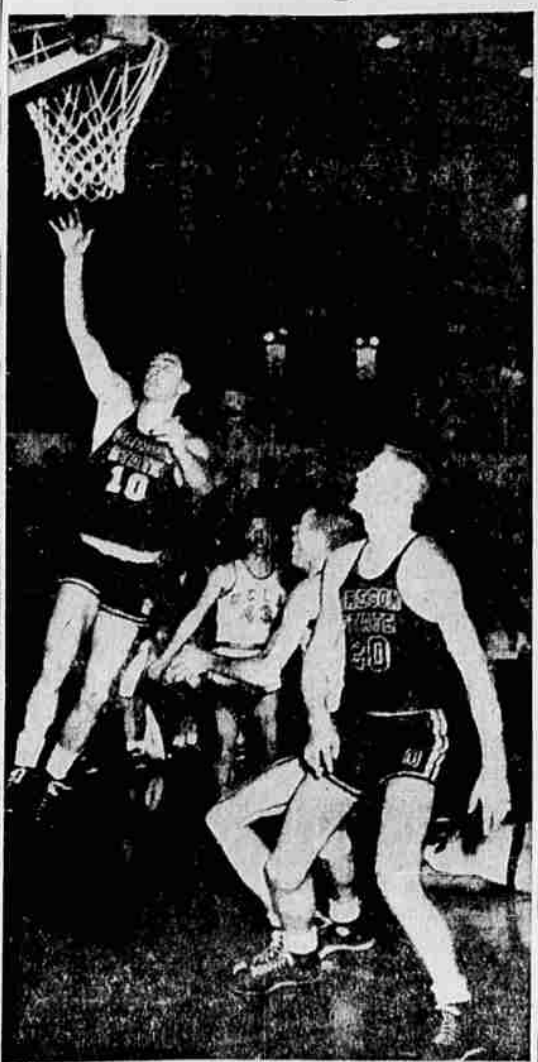

Ted Says, 'No Marriage?'; Model Unhappy but Agrees

NEW YORK (AP)—Model Nelva More has fired some verbal bolts at baseball slugger Ted Williams, who vigorously denied reports of their impending marriage.

Miss More's stepmother, Mrs. Fran More, said Thursday that Nelva, 24, and Ted, 38, would marry "in a day or two."

Nelva, beyond saying she and the diamond star would be married, refused to discuss details.

Yesterday in Boston, Williams told newsmen: "Nothing to it, nothing to it," adding:

"You know I've been initiated into that society once before. You have heard the phrase 'Had it, Well, that's me.'"

Williams' previous marriage ended in divorce in May, 1955.

Miss More, told of Williams' reaction to the reports, said last night that Williams had proposed but that she had given no definite answer. She said she had plane reservations, which she canceled, to fly to Boston to meet Williams.

"After his comments today," said Miss More, "I am giving a definite answer. I am not going to marry him and I would not."

"As for his remarks, I think it was hardly a gentlemanly thing to do," she added.

Miss More, who had a part in the Broadway play, "The Fifth Season," said she had known Williams since he got out of the Marine Corps in 1954.

Major Pension Plan Said to Be Best Ever

Players Now Expected To Go for Higher Minimum Pay

NEW YORK (AP)—Major league baseball today has a benefit-packed pension plan described by officials as unequalled anywhere.

And having met player demands for increased benefits—which include a whopping 75 per cent boost in monthly pension checks—it wouldn't be surprising if the American and National Leagues shelled a request for a raise in minimum salaries during their joint winter meeting today.

The players have asked that the present \$6,000 minimum be increased to \$7,500.

The sweeping advance in pension benefits was unanimously approved by the owners of the 16 major league clubs in separate meetings yesterday.

They granted a minimum monthly pension of \$80 and upped the maximum monthly check to \$550. The new plan, awaiting a federal law ruling before it goes into effect April 1, also includes a 50 per cent increase in insurance benefits and new disability and hospitalization benefits.

The retirement benefits are available at age 50 to players, coaches and trainers with at least five years service, who have contributed to the plan. They also may postpone collection of the pension checks until age 60 to 65, with additional bonuses.

Here's the way the old and new benefit scales at age 50 compare:

Years of Service	Old	New
5	\$80	\$175
10	\$100	\$225
20	\$150	\$300

A 10-year man can collect \$275 a month by waiting until he's 65. The plan is retroactive to include those eligible under pension benefits originated in 1947.

The pension fund gets its biggest contribution from TV-radio coverage of the World Series and all-star game and from gate receipts of the latter.

The participants contribute an average of \$2 a day during the playing season. The old contribution was \$1.50 average a day.

Commissioner Ford Frick emphasized the new plan could be guaranteed for only five years because the fund is dependent on the TV-radio contract, a five-year pact for 1957 million dollars effective this year.

Roger Johnson Leads Upset Over Top-Ranked Axemen

Marshallfield, whose squad is backed by its state championship football team, scored a major basketball upset Friday night when it knocked off Eugene, ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press Oregon high school poll.

The score was 56-54. It was close all the way and featured a scoring duel between two 1956 All-Stars, 6-3 Roger Johnson of Marshallfield, and 6-5 Charlie Warren of Eugene. Johnson wound up with 31 points. Warren had 29.

It was Eugene's first defeat in class A-1 Midwestern Conference (district 5) play and its second loss in 15 games. Marshallfield was unranked in the poll.

Klamath Falls, rated No. 2, made it 11 wins in 13 starts when it trounced Central Point, 62-49, in Southern Oregon Conference action.

In the Portland League, third-ranked Benson whacked Cleveland, 48-37. Lincoln, tied with Hermiston for No. 10, was upset by Grant, 50-46. Jefferson, which fell from the top ten when it lost to Benson last week, beat Rosevelt 34-41.

The results left Benson, Jefferson and Grant tied for first place in the league, which sends three teams to the class A-1 tournament in March.

CHICAGO (AP)—Contributions to the Joe Louis Fund, a campaign to help the former heavyweight champion clear up his \$1,200,000 back income tax, are lagging.

John Youngheart of Norfolk, Neb., one of the originators of the fund, Friday announced some \$3,000 has been raised since the campaign started about two weeks ago.

Youngheart said there has been response from all 48 states, but "at a back a ride, it's going to be a long ride to get Joe out of debt."

"It's the little man who gives the most," Youngheart said. "The big people who 's did a lot for me are the most reluctant to help."
