

# Miler Jim Bailey Named Winner of Hayward Award

## Prothro Close 2nd At Portland Event

### Transplanted Australian Was First To Run 4-Minute Mile in U.S., Beating Landy in Upset

PORTLAND (Special)—The Australian who likes to run for the University of Oregon—Jim Bailey—has joined the list of illustrious winners of the Bill Hayward trophy for outstanding contribution to Oregon athletics.

His selection, something on the surprise side, was based on his feat of running the first four-minute mile on American soil, last summer at Los Angeles when he beat his countryman, John Landy, in 3:58.6. The little running machine is full of surprises.

His margin over runner-up Tommy Prothro was reported to be small. Making the final choice were 50 persons from various fields of sports. Prothro brought Oregon State college football out of the doldrums and in two seasons coached the Beavers to a Rose Bowl berth.

**Unexpected Decision**  
About 700 persons paid \$5 each to attend the 3½-hour program which followed a free bites to eat. George Pasero, Oregon Journal sports editor, was master of ceremonies. Duffy Daugherty, Michigan State university coach, was speaker, mixing humor and philosophy in a dosage that was strong on humor.

Said Bailey in his acceptance remarks: "This is unexpected, since I haven't been an Oregonian very long. It will make a terrific impression on my friends back home that this country has given this honor to an Australian."

Bailey, former NCAA mile champion at Oregon, also represented his native land in the Olympic Games but was forced to withdraw from the 1500 meters because of hay fever. He showed no signs of the malady in the smoke-filled Columbia Athletic club dining hall.

A list of nearly 80 Oregon sports standouts in 1956 had been screened to 12 by the Oregon Sportswriters and Sportsasters Association, a group of sports writers, Prothro and his star tackle, John Witte, had been considered pre-banquet favorites for the ninth annual event.

Bailey's 3:58.6 mile, only six tenths above the world record of Landy's, was dramatic. He pulled up even with Landy on the final turn, encouraged Landy to make his sport for a new record, so they covered that he (Bailey) felt good himself, and sprinted to victory in a major upset.

**Bill Bottler Returns**  
**Little Rock Contract**  
PORTLAND (Special) — Bill Bottler, who pitched last year for Spokane of the Northwest Baseball League, said he has sent back unsigned a contract from Little Rock of the class AA Southern Assn. He said it called for too small a pay increase.

Bottler was sold by Spokane to the Chicago White Sox which assigned him to Little Rock. He is a brother of Ron Bottler, Portland Beaver catcher.

**Lindsey May Not Get Title**  
**Chance Despite New Victory**  
Luther Lindsey gained his second straight wrestling victory over Gentleman Ed Francis Tuesday night at the Salem Armory, but he still may not get a chance at Francis' Pacific Northwest heavyweight crown.

Lindsey, the stocky strong boy from the East coast, whipped Francis in two straight falls but just as last week, got an assist from the referee in notching his triumph.

Francis lost the first fall to Luther when he succumbed to a full Nelson. During subsequent action, both grapplers rolled out of the ring and Francis took advantage of the situation to drive home a

few rights to the jaw of his opponent.

Referee Tommy Martindale grabbed Francis from behind and while he was held, Francis took a few licks from Lindsey, who heaved back into the ring, and Lindsey won it on a body press.

Because of this bad turn of events, Francis later asserted that Lindsey never would get a shot at the title, unless the Salem Wrestling Commission forces it.

In other matches Tuesday, Wild Bill Savage got one fall in his battle with Tito Carrson. Bull Montana crushed Red Russian with a pile-driver, and Martindale and Alex Perez wrestled to a draw.

## Speaker Pays Tribute to 12 In Final Picks

### Daugherty Doubts Any State Could Have Finer Group

PORTLAND (Special) — Hugh "Duffy" Daugherty is 12 finalists for the Hayward Award at the annual banquet Tuesday at the Columbia Athletic Club.

"This is as fine a group as any state could put upon this podium," the pink-faced speaker said. From the 12 came the 1956 winner, Jim Bailey, University of Oregon miler from Australia, picked for his contribution to Oregon sports.

"The Michigan State university football coach paid tribute to the 12 finalists for the Hayward Award at the annual banquet Tuesday at the Columbia Athletic Club.

"The greatest single value of sports is learning how to win," Daugherty continued. "You should play to win—a good sport about losing but be a hard loser, always striving to excel. . . I don't care if my own son is best, but I want him to try to be the best."

He recalled the 1952 game between Oregon State and Michigan State, won by MSU with a field goal in the last seconds, 17-14, which gave the Spartans the national championship. He also recalled the 1949 game, when he was assistant to Biggie Munn at MSU, won by Oregon State, 25-20.

"Character is built in the church and in the home, but athletics still give a youngster a fine sense of values," Daugherty asserted.

"There is no easy way to be a good player. You don't amount to anything if you don't work and contribute to the team and make sacrifices."

What's He Made Of  
What makes an athlete? Daugherty said he looks for three kinds of "bones."

1. Funny bone, so he won't take himself too seriously—his sport, yes, but himself, no.
2. Wish bone, to dream of championships and going to the Rose Bowl, to have lofty ambitions and to think and act big.
3. Back bone, to give him the gumption to make ambitions come true.

McIntosh re-injured an ankle Friday and Simpson has a knee ailment.

Newell, whose team has played only one game since Jan. 12, commented, "We're probably the most rested team in college basketball. Oregon State is going to be tough, especially at home."

Stanford coach Howie Dallmar termed his Indian's two victories over Oregon last weekend the "best series we've played this year."
