

# Beavers Lose to Cal In Double-Overtime

## Defensive Tilt Flops; 73-60 Win to Bears

### Regulation Time Ends At 53-53; Gambee Hits for 26

CORVALLIS (UP) — California kept pace with UCLA atop the Pacific Coast Conference standings today but the Bears had to go two overtime periods last night before subduing Oregon State, 73-60, and run their string to seven straight conference wins.

Oregon State ran completely out of steam in that second overtime period, though, and California romped home in a breeze, putting 15 points while Oregon State made the period good for only two.

Allard Ties Game  
The Bears nearly won it in regulation time but a closing second jumper by Bob Allard knotted the count at 53-53. Through the first extra period neither team was willing to gamble and the clubs wound up still deadlocked, this time at 53 each.

Gabe Arrillaga hit for six points and Mike Diaz clipped in with four in the final five minutes to spark the Bear victory.

Larry Friend topped California's scoring for the night with 16 but scoring honors for the game were claimed by Oregon State's Dave Gambee with 26.

OSC Leads at Half  
Oregon State held a 33-28 half-time advantage but then lost it early in the second stanza when the Beavers went for six and a half minutes without hitting from the field. California moved in front finally at 49-47 and stayed there until Allard's final game tying shot that sent the teams into the first overtime.

## Wolves Upset Favored SOCE

## OCE in Third League Win; Hollingsworth Has One Point

MONMOUTH (Special) — The Oregon College of Education Wolves, seeking revenge, upset the highly-favored Southern Oregon College of Education Red Raiders, 56-43, in an Oregon Collegiate Conference Basketball game here Friday night, to gain their third OCC win of the current campaign.

OCE led from the outset, building a 20-25 intermission bulge. Dale Andrich and Kelly Hoy canned 18 and 13 points respectively for Dr. Bob Livingston's OCE aggregation, but SOCE's Dave O'Drive tanked 20 to cap game scoring honors.

Highlight of the ball game was the OCE defense's shackling of the league's leading scorer, Bill Hollingsworth, who was blanked from the field, getting only one free throw. Prior to tonight's game the Ashland ace boasted a 19.9 game average.

In the prelude, the powerful Oregon Fresh blasted the Wolf Jayvees, 94-45.

## Operation for Jensen's Knee

PORTLAND (UP) — Bjarne Jensen, all-star basketball center at last year's state tournament, will undergo surgery for a ruptured knee cartilage Monday.

The 6-9 senior injured his leg for a second time in play last week, and was benched for the season. He plays for Franklin High, which won the state title last year, but is out of the running in the Portland League this year.

## UCLA Remains Unbeaten With 68-65 Victory

California and UCLA are still undefeated and tied for the Pacific Coast Conference basketball lead, but only after two chillers in which the Bruins whipped Washington, 68-65, running their string of PCC victories to 23, and California had to go two overtime periods to best Oregon State, 73-60.

UCLA now has won 34 consecutive regular season games, and its 23 in a row, playoffs included, constitutes a new PCC record.

The Bruins and California have won seven straight conference games this season, and a five game Saturday night with Washington and Oregon State, respectively.

USC Edges Idaho  
Stanford bested Washington State, 60-51, and Southern California nosed out Idaho, 89-83.

Washington got out in front of UCLA at Seattle but the Bruins rallied and trailed only 29-25 at the half. Center Bruno Boin and forward Doug Smart contributed 27 of the Huskies points in this period. Fred Crabtree of UCLA led at Seattle but the Bruins one half minutes to go. UCLA wasn't headed afterward.

It was the first time UCLA had beaten Washington in Seattle. Stanford led its game against Washington State by ball control in the waning minutes. Larry Beck of WSC was high scorer with 16, although he played only half the game because he incurred four personals in the first half and was removed late in the contest.

Indians Use Ball Control  
Stanford's win gave the Indians a firm grasp on fourth place in the standings, with five wins and four defeats. The Cougars have 3-6.

Idaho made a game rally late in its contest with Southern California and came close to winning. The Vandals trailed by 12 points midway in the second half, but their high scoring guard, Gary Simmons, got them started on a scoring spree that just barely fell short.

USC had an 87-86 lead with 64 seconds to go, and went into a stall. When Idaho fouled trying to break it, forward Jack Mount calmly threw a second free throw. Gary McEwen contributed an Idaho basket just as the gun sounded.

MOLALLA 55, DALLAS 48  
The high-geared Molalla Indians took over undisputed first place in the Willamette Valley league circuit.

The victory, which gave Molalla the league lead, was highlighted by a second-half Indian rally, sparked by Hal Ogburn. Dallas led, 27-25, at the half, but couldn't stand prosper.

Ogburn led the winners with 16 points, but yielded game scoring honors to Jack Bernier, who tanked 19 for Dallas.

The Dallas Jaycees won the prelude, 55-43.

ESTACADA 41, SANDY 41  
The Estacada Rangers put on a 20-point scoring burst in the third period to break the hearts of the Sandy Pioneers. The Rangers, behind 21-23 at the half, pulled the game out of the fire with their third-period rally, and closed out the final canto by tallying only three points, all coming from the foul line.

John Woodcock and Ron Hare canned 11 points each for Estacada. Gary McVey took game honors for Sandy with 17.

Sandy salvaged the Jayvee game, 49-23.

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## Same Old Story: Kentucky Could Be Real Number One

### Rupp's Team Cops Tourney Bids; 17-3 Record

It seems like old times for Adolph Rupp and his Kentucky Wildcats.

With North Carolina and Kansas, running one-two in the Associated Press poll and stealing most of the early season thunder, the Wildcats — the nation's No. 3 team, were more or less shut to the background. Now it's Kentucky's turn to make its presence felt.

The Baron's Bluegrass club boosted its overall won-lost record to 17-3 last night with a 75-69 up-hill victory over Mississippi. The Wildcats, after losing two of their first six starts, have bounced back to take 13 of the last 14.

In the process, Kentucky annexed two holiday tournaments — its own Kentucky Invitational and Sugar Bowl in New Orleans. The lads from Lexington last lost to Tulane 68-60 Jan. 14 in a league game.

The Kentuckians, in whipping

Ole Miss, solidified their lead in the Southeastern Conference race with an 8-1 mark. Runner-up Tulane is 5-2.

Only two other members of the top 10 saw action last night and both won. UCLA, No. 5, rallied in the second half to edge Washington 68-65 and extend its string of Pacific Coast Conference to a record 23 straight. Wake Forest, No. 10, rebounded from a defeat by South Carolina Thursday night to turn back Clemson 93-72 in an Atlantic Coast Conference.

In other games: Dayton set a Philadelphia Palestra scoring record by overwhelming Villanova 102-70 in the second game of a doubleheader after Temple trimmed Seton Hall 70-51 in the opener; California, ranked 19th nationally, kept pace with UCLA in the PCC by outlasting Oregon State 73-60 in two overtimes and Joe Anderson's jump shot with 15 seconds left gave Oklahoma a 57-55 thriller over the Oklahoma Aggies in the 160th meeting between the state rivals.

Also: Lee Marshall's 40 points led Washington and Lee to an 89-70 triumph over Davidson and The Citadel staged off a late comeback to down VMI 78-70 in Southern Conference action; Syracuse's second half spurt toppled Holy Cross 82-66; Siena posted a 63-62 verdict over Army; Arizona defeated West Texas 77-67; Stanford prevailed over Washington State 60-51 and Southern California nipped Idaho 89-88.

Three years after these fights he was charged with income tax on his share of the receipts and where we know that he actually received none of the money.

"The only support that I have been able to determine for the government's charging Joe tax on this money was the fact that the checks were made out to Joe and he endorsed them and turned them over to the various relief funds.

Bud Advice Along the Line  
"There have been many other snafus along the line where his accountants, his managers, and a host of promoters and hangers-on both gave him bad advice and clipped the kitty, so to speak, before Joe ever saw any of his earnings.

"It is true that Joe made some bad investments and lived on a pretty grand scale while he was champ, but after all isn't a champion entitled to some of the finer things of life? Actually as near as we can determine, Joe handled only about \$224,000 in 11 years other than the \$1,100,000 he paid in taxes.

"The committee all feel that Joe was a good, clean living champion and is fully entitled to live a life free of the income tax problems that now hound him. It is my personal feeling that many people who listened to Joe fight over the radio back in his prime could and should buy their tickets for the enjoyment they already had on the basis of \$1, \$2 or \$5.
