Dallas District To Have Additional Territory

DALLAS (Special) — Dallas district was enlarged and Independence and West Salem districts were made smaller in size when justice of the peace districts were re-arranged recently, according to Polk county district attorney, Walter Foster.

Grand Ronde district will remain the same size. Valseiz, Pedee and North and South Falls City have been removed from the Independence district to the Dallas district, and Salt Lake (Perrydale) and McCoy were moved to Dallas from West Salem.

Those in the West Salem district No. 2 are Eola, first, second, third, fourth, West Salem; Brush College and Spring Valley.

Dallas No. 3 includes Rickreall, first, second, third, fourth, and fifth Dallas, Oakdale, Salt Creek, Jackson, Buell, Salt Lake, McCoy, Rock Creek, North and South Falls City, Pedee and Bridgeport.

Independence No. 5 includes first, second, third, fourth Independence; Southeast, Southwest, Northeast and Northwest Monmouth, Buena Vista, Airline and Suver.
